The World's Hop Crop

The Seattle News published a telegram from its Washington correspondent last Thursday which contained good news for the hop growers of Washington, remarks that paper editorially. The dispatch showed that reports from the consular officers of the United States in Europe indicated a heavy shortage in the hop crop both on the continent and in Great Britain. The total of Germany shows a shortage of more than 120,000 tons. Austria's shortage is almost as large, while the crop is short in like proportion in Belgium, Russia, France and England. The crop of the United States is slightly larger than last year, the increase being 5,000,000 pounds, equal to 25 tons, a very small increase compared to the great shortage of the European crop. This means that prices will continue high and the hop grower in the United States is in a position to demand almost any sort of fancy price.

The San Francisco Chronicle has the following about converting dogs into harness oil, which would apply to many other cities of the country. It says: "The San Bernardino health authorities are interesting themselves in the conduct of an establishment near that city which converts stray curs into good harness oil. It is possible that the process of conversion may be attended by some bad smells, but they cannot by any possibility be as prejudicial to the health of the public, or interfere as much with its comfort as a pest of canines. It would be a good thing for San Francisco if half a dozen or so of harness oil factories were started within easy distance of the city. Raw material to keep them going could be provided in abundance."

Roger Q. Mills is mentioned as a possible successor to Senator Bailey, of Texas, providing the opposition is strong enough in the next legislature to defeat the Standard oil representative. Mills was prominent as a congressman a good many years ago, gaining prominence as author of the Mills tariff bill, but of late years has been as politically dead as even Alton B. Parker.

While we are talking about street pavements, city parks and other public improvements, it would be a good idea for the city to make some arrangements for ground upon which to build a creditable city hall. The present building is located on county land, and no permanent improvements would be advisable until the city has property of its own.

If this can be done with residence property certainly the business streets of cities like Albany should be paved and placed on a permanent footing. Perhaps nothing gives a small city a more metropolitan appearance, besides it is a money saver in the long run.

Superstitions of Farmers.

Farmers "stick to the moon" in regard to planting corn and other crops. Some of them will not under any circumstances plant corn on moonlight nights, claiming that corn planted then will produce a tall stalk with a short ear. Others just as successfully plant when they are ready, when nights are dark or moonlight, as the case may be. Other notions are indulged in, such as throwing the cobs in running water to keep corn from firing. Some farmers would under no consideration burn pinder hulls, the seed of which is to be used for planting. They must be scattered along a path or highway, to be trodden upon in order to secure a good crop. Green butter bean hulls must be thrown in a road after being shelled for table use from day to day to insure a good crop the following season.—Charleston News and Courier.
