OFFICERS MAKE AN IMPORTANT ARREST

Notorious Criminal Caught on Willamette Street This Afternoon

Sheriff Fisk, Deputy Sheriff Hammond and Two Spokane Officers Arrested William Mathews, Alias Billy Davis - Submitted Peaceably

Wm. Mathews, alias Billy Davis, a notorious horse thief and cattle rustler, was captured in Eugene this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock by Sheriff Fisk, and Deputy Hammond, of this city, Deputy Sheriff F. K. Pugh and Special Deputy Sheriff H. J. Hamlin, of Spokane.

The capture was made in front of Dunn's dry goods store. As Mathews was walking along the street the four officers mentioned met him and Sheriff Fisk and Deputy Sheriff Pugh confronted him with their revolvers ordered him to throw up his hands. He was not slow in complying with the request and was at once handcuffed and taken to the sheriff's office.

Mathews is wanted for horse stealing in Spokane county. He left Spokane Wednesday and reached Eugene either yesterday or Thursday. He will be taken back to the Washington city as soon as the necessary requisition papers are secured and in the meantime will stay in the Lane county jail.

HAD NO GUN.
Mathews as searched on the street

as soon as the handcuffs were placed on his wrists, but no arms were found on his person. Deputy Sheriff Pugh stated to a Guard reporter that this was the first time he was ever found without a gun.

SERVED TIME BEFORE.
Mathews is an ex-convict, having served in the Walla Walla penitentiary four years and is said to be an all-around bad man. In 1891 he was a member of a cattle rustling gang in Montana. The officers got after the gang and killed Miles, a partner of Mathews, the latter succeeding in evading arrest until 1894, when he was caught and was sentenced to the Wala Walla prison for four years.

Mathews has relatives at Junction City. They are said to be highly respectable people.

During his career of crime Mathews has shot two officers, but not fatally, one of them being Deputy Sheriff Pugh's brother.

RAILWAY CLERKS GO ON STRIKE FOR BETTER PAY

El Paso, Texas, Oct. 3.—Every member of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks in the Atlantic system of the Southern Pacific, from El Paso to New Orleans, went on strike this morning. The clerks ask ten per cent increase in wages, pay for overtime and recognition of the order.

AWFUL CRIME OF INSANE FARMER

Newport, Tenn., Oct. 13.—Chalburn Mintooth, aged fifty, one of the most prominent farmers in this neighborhood, today murdered his wife and four children and fatally injured two other children, then committed suicide by cutting his throat. All evidences indicate that Mintooth became suddenly insane. The crimes were committed with an ax, braining his wife and children.

SHELLEY LOT MAY BE THE ONE SELECTED

A. F. Statter, secretary to Secretary of the Treasury Shaw, who was here yesterday afternoon and this forenoon examined the several sites offered for the new government postoffice building, left for the north on this afternoon's train. While here he would give out no public information in regard to the probable choice of locations, but it is reliably rumored that the J. M. Shelley property at the corner of West Eighth and Charnelton streets is the one favored. The price asked for this piece of property is \$6666.50. Two prominent property holders were heard to remark this morning after an interview with Mr. Statter that they would bet two to one that the Shelley property is selected. They seemed to have a pretty straight tip.

SUCCESSFUL TEST OF HURST SWITCH

The many Eugene investors in the stock of the Hurst Automatic Switch Co. will read the following from the Salt Lake City Republican of October 10 with interest:

"The new automatic switch being constructed by the Hurst company was completed yesterday and several private tests were made with engine 283 of the Oregon Short Line, which seemed fairly well to demonstrate the claims made for the new device. These tests were witnessed by the yardmaster of the road and several others prominent in the mechanical department.

"The private tests made yesterday on the Oregon Short Line tracks between Second South and Third South streets, were made with the engine that has been equipped with the manual operating device with which the engineer or fireman, while a train is moving, in approaching the switch, can throw it in either direction. One of the first features shown was to demonstrate that with the device in use an engine or train could not run into an open or misplaced switch from either direction. When the engineer applied the operating device and had taken the siding, the switch was locked in place and held by the weight of the train until after the last trucks on the train had passed the switch. Then, the switch closed automatically with the main line clear and locked. It was also demonstrated that the switch could be actuated by hand in the usual way, and also that it could not be thrown by any means while the train was passing over it, or until the last trucks had cleared the main line.

CARS OPERATE SWITCH.

"Another test was made when the train on the siding was pulled out upon the main line, the switch being operated by the weight of the cars on the rods placed along the sides of the rails. When the train had cleared the siding and the interlocking device the switch automatically closed again for the main line."

CURBING FOR THE PARK BLOCKS

The city council at its adjourned session last night passed an ordinance requiring a cement curbing to be built 14 feet from the property line on both sides of Oak street, commencing at the south line of South Park street and extending north to the south line of East Eighth street, and on the south side of East Eighth street, commencing at the east line of West Park street and running east to the west line of East Park street. This will do away with the hitching of teams on the Oak and East Eighth street sides of the parks.

PORTLAND GRAIN WHARVES BARRICADED

Portland, Oct. 13.—All the wharves were barricaded during the night to prevent invasion by striking grain-handlers. There is no change in the situation today.

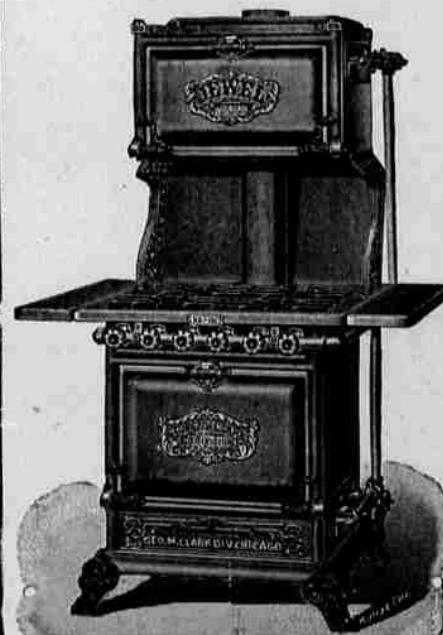
