FAMILIAR STREET FIGURE GOES TO ARKANSAS

D. R. Wood, Cripple Who Conducted a Little Candy Stand on Street Corner, Leaves Eugene After Saving \$500

D. R. Wood, the cripple, who for the past several years has conducted a candy and soda water business in a small building on the streets of Eugene, left last night for his old home in Arkansas where he expects to remain during the balance of his life.

Wood's little place of business, which for two or three years was located on the Chambers-Bristow bank corner, was an object of much curiosity to strangers. The building is about six feet long, five feet wide and scarcely over six feet high. The owner sat in the building all day, year in and year out, rain or shine, and dispensed his wares through a window. He never carried more than a few dollars' worth of goods at a time, but his sales often amounted to considerable, sometimes two or three dollars a day, but often not more than a few cents.

Wood lived alone in a little house formerly located at the corner of West Fifth and Olive streets, but about a year ago moved to a rear lot near the railroad grounds. He owned the building and sold it just before he left. The man during his six years' residence here lived very frugally, and it is said in that time he succeeded in saving \$500, which he drew from a local bank yesterday. For two or three years before he opened his little store he worked about town at odd jobs and was often seen sawing and splitting wood, very difficult things for him to do on account of his physical condition—he

was unable to bend either his back or his knees.

The man would never accept charity, always preferring to make his own way, and was often seen to contribute to the help of beggars on the streets, who were far more able to work for their living than he was. He is conscientiously religious, and would never sell cigars and tobacco at his stand, when he knew he could make much more money that way, because he thought it was wrong to do so.

COMMITTEE MEETS WITH FRATERNITIES

Faculty at the University Discusses and Inquires Into Matters but No New Rules or Regulations Are Made - Mandolin Club Organizes With Ten Members

Thursday night a committee composed of Prof. Young, Carson, Straub, and McAllister, and President Campbell met with representatives from the fraternities, sororities and clubs of the students of the university to look after the welfare of the organizations. Various matters were discussed and inquired into, but no new rules or regulations were made and President Campbell stated yesterday morning that the faculty had no intention of making any, at least until the necessity was evident.

The committee of the faculty on the living organizations of the students is an innovation this year and the meeting last night was the first. Three or four will be held each year. The entire purpose of the committee is to look after the welfare of the different students' clubs, and was demanded by the growth of the university.

MANDOLIN CLUB ORGANIZES. Thursday evening the Mandolin Club formed a preliminary organization in Villard Hall. About ten candidates were present. A little later three or four others will join and the permanent personnel will be determined. Robert Nelson will lead the club this year.

Five teams are working on the excavation for the artificial lake at the northwest corner of the campus. The dirt which is removed is used to level the surface of the nearby land.

FOUND EUGENE HYDRANT SYSTEM SATISFACTORY

LARGEST CLASS IN HISTORY OF SCHOOLS

FIRST PRACTICE FOOTBALL GAME THIS AFTERNOON

Between Two Squads for the Varsity Team—Training Table Will Be Established Tuesday—At First Only Sixteen Men Will Eat There

This afternoon a practice game between two squads of men of the candidates for the university football team is being played on Kincaid field. Dr. H. R. B. Leonard, a former half back of the University of Michigan, is referee. The halves are 20 minutes each.

The object of the game is to accustom the men to excitement and the new rules and to select the men for the training table.

Monday secret practice begins. The practice will be kept un-seen most of the time until the Idaho game. This means that Coach Bezdek will give his men advanced work under the new rules. Lectures to aid in this regard will also begin next week.

Owing to unfortunate circumstances the training table will not be established until Tuesday. At first only sixteen men will be allowed to eat there. The best of the remainder of the squad will have to prove before allowed the privilege.
