

# RICHARDSON SPEAKS ON THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST

Able Address Delivered by  
Portland Commercial Club  
Manager

Before Students of University and  
Townpeople at Assembly This  
Morning--Consul H. B. Miller  
Will Speak at Next Assembly

This morning Tom Richardson, manager of the Portland Commercial Club and a man of great reputation along the lines of development in the Pacific Northwest, addressed the assembly of the university on "The Pacific Northwest". Mr. Richardson is a fluent and very entertaining speaker, especially so when he has a subject so close to his heart as the one this morning.

After a beautiful solo by Miss Grace Mount, entitled, "Stolen Wings," and a splendid instrumental solo by Miss Whiteside, Mr. Richardson said in part:

"The boy and girl born in the Pacific Northwest have a differential in their favor, if I may be allowed the use of a transportation term, over those who start in life in the older portions of our great republic."

"This new and most progressive section has its eyes, hopes and ambitions upon the future rather than the past. We are making society and not trying to break into one that lives upon its pedigree. We are sowing the seed with the anticipation of an abundant crop, and not sitting in easy chairs clipping coupons from interest-bearing securities. Ours is a land of pursuit, we are building, and the foundation upon which our structure will grow is the best soil, the best climate and the best citizenship in this broad land."

"The Pacific Northwest, like Theodore Roosevelt, is intensely American. Nowhere else is there such a small number of that class of immigrants which is usually looked upon as undesirable and which is pouring into the United States now at the rate of a million a year. I am referring to those from Italy, especially Sicily, and Austria-Hungary, for the Englishman, the Frenchman, the German and the Dutchman are not coming in large numbers."

"Nature has made the Pacific Northwest a country of superlatives. It has the best average climate of any portion of the temperate zone, though every variety of climate conditions can be found within its broad extent. We could talk for hours on its scenic attractions and then not be half through the story. First, of course, and of most general interest would be the commanding Columbia; then marvelous Crater Lake in our own loved Oregon, and Lakes Chelan and Washington in the Evergreen state to the North. Shoshone Falls in Idaho, not to mention more than a dozen great mountains which look like solid snow and already have a world-wide reputation."

"Here in this marvelous land of the Pacific Northwest is the greatest forest wealth in all the known world. Its value runs into the billions, and judging from the remark of James J. Hill that one acre of average Oregon timber furnishes 180 times as much traffic as 180 acres of wheat, it must be the first cause in bringing the great transportation companies to this Northwestern Coast. When we consider that we are only handling our timber in a primitive way, allowing other sections to manufacture the furniture, cars, woodenwork and musical instruments--in fact, every kind of utility--and realize that through intense competition these factories must of necessity come to us in a few years, we cannot estimate in imagination what our wealth from this source will amount to, but can appreciate the force of a statement recently made that the timber lands of the Pacific Northwest will turn out millionaires like sunspots."

"The Northwest is producing the best cattle, sheep and horses, and the livestock industry insures ample returns, for it means the coming of the packing house on a large scale, a consequent active and constant market to the stock man. The dairy interests of the Northwest are already enormous, and in conjunction with the raising of poultry, present an avenue which will afford employment to thousands of well-to-do and prosperous people."

"Of course Lewis and Clark discovered the Pacific Northwest a little over a hundred years ago, but the real discovery of this great land was made last year, when we got to

gether at the great exposition given in the city of Portland and not only educated ourselves but convinced travelers from all sections of the United States and many foreign countries of the almost matchless opportunities offered here now as well as for the future.

"To be really great in this Northwestern country we must be great in educational institutions. We must be proud of our schools, colleges and universities. Every citizen of Oregon should not only consider it a duty but a pleasure to add to the strength and power of this university. The alumni of the U. of O. is as loyal as that of Harvard or Yale, but should be kept constantly organized and actively at work to add to the prestige of its Alma Mater. In addition to annual meetings, a complete poll of the alumni should be kept, and there should be various meetings in various sections of the state."

"It is the duty of the young man and the young woman leaving college to participate in public life. Don't confine yourself to your own business or to your own personal affairs--get a little time to take part in the commercial and industrial affairs of your community. Be a good citizen, and this can be done without neglecting your individual obligations, because today the prosperous, contented man is the one who devotes a portion of his time and gives some of his money for the benefit of the community of which he is a part."

"We want to keep the standard of citizenship high in the Northwest. We want to make our Northwestern cities clean morally as well as physically; we want the reputation of having a superior school system; we want libraries, parks and public institutions which are a credit; we want to keep in touch with the affairs of our country as a whole and to be familiar with what is going on in the great outside world."

"We should make our section inviting from every point of view, for when its transportation lines number ten times the mileage of the present time, when its rivers and harbors are improved, when intensive farming becomes a necessity on account of the increased value of our productive lands, here is to be established a civilization which I firmly believe is to be the best in the world. The people of the Northwest are normal--they are not partisan nor are they prejudiced."

"Good, clean citizenship predominates, and you young men and women who are leaving this splendid school must remain in the Northwest, preferably in Oregon, for you are in a country offering more in the immediate future than any other to which you might go. There is not an avenue in which we are not advancing, and the chances for success, for fortune winning, will be just as good a year from now as they were last--and they will be more numerous in ten years than they are now."

"Young men and women, you don't have to move. You are already located in the Garden of Eden so far as America is concerned. You have the advantage of the newcomer in knowing thoroughly the conditions. Stay here and invite others to come and help you build an empire at which the world will marvel."

The address was enjoyed by about 300 students and townspeople.

MILLER TO SPEAK.  
Consul H. B. Miller, formerly of this city but now in the diplomatic service of the United States, will speak at the assembly next Wednesday. Mr. Miller won national renown as consul at Niu Chwang during the Japanese-Russian war and will be one of the most prominent speakers at the university this year.
