EXCITING CHASE AFTER

HUGE BROWN BEAR

Four Hundred-Pound Monster Killed Near Goshen at Noon Today. Had Been Caught In a Trap but Got Away

A number of farmers in the vicinity of Goshen engaged in an exciting bear hunt this forenoon. Robert Drury, the well-known hunter and trapper, caught a huge brown bear in a trap, which he set in Dr. Sharples' prune orchard last night. By main strength the bear pulled his foot out of the trap and got away, but soon afterward the neighbors gathered with their guns and dogs and sending for John Wallace's hounds gave chase. Bruin was cornered near the Coast Fork bridge about noon and a battle royal between him and the dogs ensued. Just as the bear had killed one of the hounds his career was ended by a shot from Bud Kintzley's rifle. Even in his death struggles he still grasped the dog in his jaws.

The bear weighed about 400 pounds, being the biggest seen in that vicinity for years. The foot that was caught in the trap was terribly mangled, showing that the bear worked a long time to free himself. About ten men engaged in the hunt.
