Corruption in 'Frisco

There is no question in the mind of any one at all familiar with affairs in San Francisco that existing conditions are the most corrupt ever witnessed in that boss ridden city. People all over the country are watching the outcome of the proceedings in the court today. Even in the boldest days of Boss Buckley, and his corrupt officials he never attempted to fly in the face of public sentiment as Abe Reuf has done. Buckley, while not above bribery or corruption of almost any character, had some respect for public opinion and refused to go beyond a certain limit. When they refused to heed his warnings they were promptly beheaded. That accounted for Buckley being able to retain his control for so many years. But vice ridden as San Francisco was twenty years ago it finally tired of Buckley and his gang and the blind boss was compelled to take up his residence in Canada for several years until the storm of public indignation had blown over and thus escape criminal indictment, or at the least an unpleasant investigation by the grand jury.

With such a weak man as Mayor Schmidt to control, Abe Reuf has so profited by vice, bribery and all manner of criminal graft that he has become emboldened as was William M. Tweed in the palmy days of Tammany Hall some thirty years ago, when he and his fellow thieves robbed the people of New York of more than \$30,000,000, says the Seattle News. When the investigation which resulted in sending Tweed to the penitentiary began that arch grafter exclaimed, "What are you going to do about it?" And notwithstanding that the courts were under his control there was enough civic virtue and decency left in vice ridden New York city to show Tweed that the people were going to do about it.

Now Abe Reuf is asking the same thing of the people of San Francisco, and he and his pals are as brazen in their attitude as was Tweed, Oakley Hall and others of the old Tammany gang. San Francisco people have long been quiescent under the most outrageous corruption and vice, but it seems that they are finally aroused and propose to purge the city of Reuf and his fellow grafters. If the people will show the old time spirit of the Vigilante days and vigorously support Francis J. Heney in his prosecution of Reuf and his gangsters, there is no question that the result will be exactly the same as it was with Tweed and his fellow followers in New York.

Dr. Wiley, the chemist of the department of agriculture, whose experiments in feeding borax and other chemicals to boarders have given him much notoriety, smilingly confesses that he is anxious to experiment with the effect of "booze" on the human system, but cannot do so until congress gives him permission. The danger that Dr. Wiley might incur the habit of drinking in his "boarders" will prevent congress from ever granting him permission to experiment on these lines. The views of the distinguished chemist on whisky are well known. He holds

that nothing but the almost raw product of the still can be properly termed "whisky," and all other whiskies should be labelled "compound" or "adulterated." The good doctor's recommendation gave the rawer whiskies quite a boost, but of late the manufacturers of these brands have discontinued using his utterances for advertising purposes. The whiskey experiments will come along about the time Dr. Wiley tries to feed his boarders on cigarettes and plug tobacco.

At Seattle an unknown expert lathe worker has been taking fifty cents and a dollar or thereabouts from five and ten dollar gold pieces respectively, then passing them back into circulation. It does not seem possible that a tenth could be taken from the coins without detaching them so they would not pass, but it is said the banks themselves have been loaded down with the light weight coins, so neatly is the work done.

Annie McDonald, of Clackamas county wants a divorce at Oregon City. She alleges she had to perform manual labor in the fields and that the husband was "no good for anything except wasting money." She upsets this allegation, though, with another that he is the father of her eleven minor children. He has not been entirely idle.

The ice trust men, of Toledo, Ohio, had their inning during the hot season, now the people are getting theirs. The supreme court of that state has just affirmed the sentence of the lower court of a fine of \$2500 and six months in the workhouse for the members of the trust.

Young Governor Proctor, of Vermont, declared in his inaugural address that the prosperity of the country is not due solely to the policies of the Republican party. He must not have heard Speaker Cannon's speeches in Vermont.

Portland wood dealers refuse to sell cordwood uncut. They have the very good reason that they make a profit in cutting, besides they can sell about seven-eighths of a cord of the loose short length wood for a cord.
