Money Easy in New York

Writing on Saturday, Henry Clews, of New York, takes this hopeful view of the monetary outlook:

"The best feature in the financial situation is the easier condition of the local money market. Both call and time rates have declined, six months' time only being quoted at five and three-fourths and six per cent—the lowest rate since the crop movement began. This relief is, of course, due to gold imports, treasury disbursements and a probability that the exodus to the interior has reached its height. From now on easier local conditions should prevail and bank reserves should rise until the end of the year, provided no disturbances occur during the interval and the shifting back of American loans in London does not proceed too rapidly.

"The Bank of England rate was advanced from four to five per cent, and the Bank of Germany from five to six per cent. These are extraordinarily sudden and high advances by these two institutions. They have but one meaning; that is, notice to New York that those markets are closed to us for the financial relief upon which we have hitherto depended. Fortunately, we are now beyond the necessity of assistance from that quarter, having secured over \$40,000,000 of gold this autumn, so that the precaution is somewhat tardy and ineffectual."

Lesson From Scriptures

In thy works keep to thyself the pre-eminence, leave not a stain in thine honor.

"At the time when thou shalt end thy days and finish thy life, distribute thine inheritance."

The aged man thanked the attorney for the reading of the lesson, then tottered away.
