

RUBY MILLER ENTERS PLEA OF NOT GUILTY

Girl Indicted Last Spring for Lewd
Cohabitation, Will Be Tried at
This Term of Court - Numerous
Civil Cases Disposed of To-
day

Ruby Miller, the girl who gained
so much notoriety last spring for
being mixed up in the Virgil Rowland
adultery trial, was arraigned in the
circuit court this forenoon on the
charge of lewd cohabitation and
pleaded not guilty. Her trial will be
held some time next week. It will
be remembered that the girl was in-
dicted on this charge during the
term of court at which Virgil Rowland's
trial was held, but her trial
was postponed until this term.

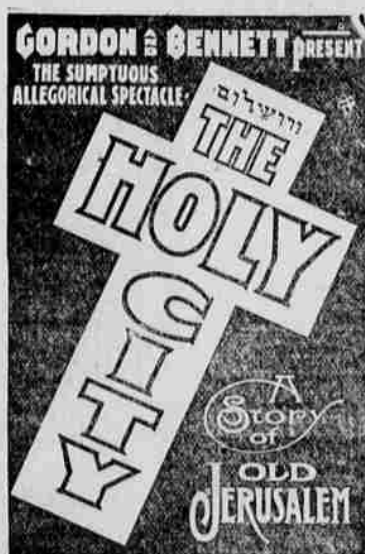
TIMBER AND LUMBER NOTES OF INTEREST

Storey-Bracher Co. of Portland Buys
Another Tract of Timber of 538
Acres--New Sawmill of Small
Capacity to Be Built South of
Cottage Grove

The Storey-Bracher Lumber Com-
pany, of Portland, who last week
bought, through the L. H. Bingham's
agency, 400 acres of land on the Coast
Fork, this week get the entire tract
of 538 acres owned by L. Gerum, ly-
ing in the same township as the former
purchase.

The fact of a car shortage is em-
phasized at J. H. Chambers' mill at
Alsea. He had only one car last
month. There are 75 car loads of
lumber on his dock awaiting ship-
ment, and the mill is cutting two car-
loads per day.

road south of Cottage Grove. The
