

ANXIETY AS TO GAME WITH WASHINGTON

Oregon Team's Playing Will Probably Be Greatly Improved Before November 17th, Date Upon Which Team From Evergreen State Appears Here

Considerable anxiety is being expressed among the students of the university as to the result of the big game with University of Washington to be played in Eugene on Nov. 17, since it was learned of the tie between Whitman and Washington Saturday. Whitman beat Willamette 9-5 and it was confidently expected here that the Eastern Washingtonians would beat their Western brothers.

The next two weeks will, it is hoped, see a vast improvement in the offense of Oregon's team, and it is safe to say that they will receive the most thorough training of the season. In the game Saturday the defense of the eleven was fine but the offense was poor. Part of this was due to the wet field, part to the dilatory tactics of Willamette, who most of the game played to kill time, and part to fumbles, but nevertheless there was something else radically wrong, which it is to be hoped will be remedied by the next game.

Oregon during the season has made only one touchdown so far, that against Astoria. Moulton, the kicking wonder of the Pacific coast, has won two games for Oregon which otherwise would have been ties. Against Idaho he made three place kicks successfully, and against Willamette only one owing to the slipperiness of the ball. That was a most difficult place kick from the 13-yard line at an angle of 45 degrees. In the first half he missed one by a bare foot and a half and tried another.

Oregon did well on the forward passes for out of seven tries he made four for big yardage. Other tricks as delayed passes, short punts, and the like did not work so well. Some yardage was made by blocking and end runs but the loss was also frequently great. Oregon kept the ball in her opponent's part of the field most of the game by running in the punts and Moulton's kicking. In returning punts Chandler and Kuykendall were the best on the field. Chandler it is safe to say put up the best football of any player.

For Willamette Kader, Nace and Thomas did good work. The Methodists played straight football, not trying any of the new style plays. They also put up a very good defense.
