## CUT OUT THE GRAFTS.

The taxpayers of Lane County will be saved several hundred dollars in the publication of the delinquent tax list this fall, because of the course taken by the Guard in submitting a bid for the work, and thus forcing the County Board to act in the interest of economy. Heretofore this work has cost 25 cents per line—this year the price the county will pay is but four cents.

This is the proper rule to follow in regard to all the county printing. There is no reason why when supplies of any kind are needed by the county, they should not be furnished by the lowest and best bidder, and printing supplies, which aggregate many hundreds of dollars yearly, sometimes running into the thousands, should come under the general rule. It has been too long the practice to allow county officials to pay their debts to political organs with unreasonable printing bills which the taxpayers must foot, or to secure a "makeoff" from the city printing concerns upon a large class of printing. That is why several large printing houses in Portland have grown rich from the business gathered up throughout the Northwest—not honestly or legitimately, but by "standing in" with county officials who receive a regular commission upon the exorbitant prices charged up to counties in which they operate.

This is an era of graft exposure, and this matter of public printing ought to have the full limelight of investigation turned upon it. This year Commissioner Edwards lost 1,000 republican votes in Lane County, and barely escaped defeat because of alleged overcharge in the matter of his salary—a small item indeed in comparison to the thousands of dollars that is being drawn out of the public treasury by printing of blank books, stationery and other supplies that in most cases might be bought by individuals for half the money. It is time to call a halt.

This letting of a contract to print the delinquent tax list to the lowest bidder is a step in the right direction, and the Guard does not whine because another paper secured it for a lower price. But for certain conditions in the office, which will soon be changed, we might have bid lower, and hope to be able to do so here another year rolls around. The point is that several hundreds of dollars has been saved the county, and it is up to the sheriff to further protect the taxpayers by making sure that the bid is in no way offset by extra padding of the list.

The Guard proposes to demand of the county board and county officials that all printing be let to the lowest bidder. If it is refused, then the public will know where to place the responsibility at the next election, and the rocky road that Commissioner Edwards travelled last June will seem like scorching on an asphalt pavement compared to the political experience of the next officials who disregard the demand of the people for a square deal around.

## NEW LINOTYPE AT WORK IN GUARD OFFICE

The Guard is trying a new linotype machine to-day, and we trust that this is all the explanation needed for the appearance of the paper this evening.

This machine, which is the latest model made, was secured late Saturday night and started casting type for the first time this afternoon. It will after to-day give better facilities for setting type than The Guard has ever had before.

## HETTY GREEN'S SON.

"He's a Smart One" and is Now a Railroad President.

Edward Howard Robinson Green, who was nominated by the "Reorganized Republicans" for governor of Texas, but declined to run, is the son of Mrs. Hetty Green, the richest woman in America. He is president of the Texas Midland railroad, and his mother says, "Ed's a smart one." He did not become president of a railroad without working hard to attain that rung on the ladder of success, despite his mother's influence in the financial world. When he graduated from college in 1887 his mother asked him what he wanted to do.

"Well, mother," said the young man, "I think I would like, first of all, to take a vacation and have a good time. About three months would be enough, I think." The latter asked him how much money he would need for his expenses while resting, and he replied that about \$1,000 a week would suit him. She turned to her secretary and told him to place \$12,000 to young Mr. Green's credit. The latter started out to enjoy his vacation, and for twelve weeks Mrs. Green saw or heard nothing of her boy. On the last day of the last month young Green returned to his mother and reported himself ready for work. On this occasion Mrs. Green did not consult her son's wishes as to just what employment would suit him. "I want," she said, turning to her clerk, "those papers about the Connect-
