EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT

Tells Federation of Labor What It Has Done in Field of Politics. Amount of Money Collected and Disbursed - What Is Proposed To Do

Minneapolis, Nov. 13.—The recent political activity of the American Federation of Labor occupied a prominent place in the report of the executive committee today. The report stated that the total sum received for campaign purposes was \$8956, and the total expenditures \$7834. The American Federation report says it does not contemplate the formation of a distinct party, nor does it intend to dictate the party membership of the union men. But it does propose to suggest from time to time legislative measures of advantage to labor and secure the nomination and election of representatives and senators favorable to their enactment.

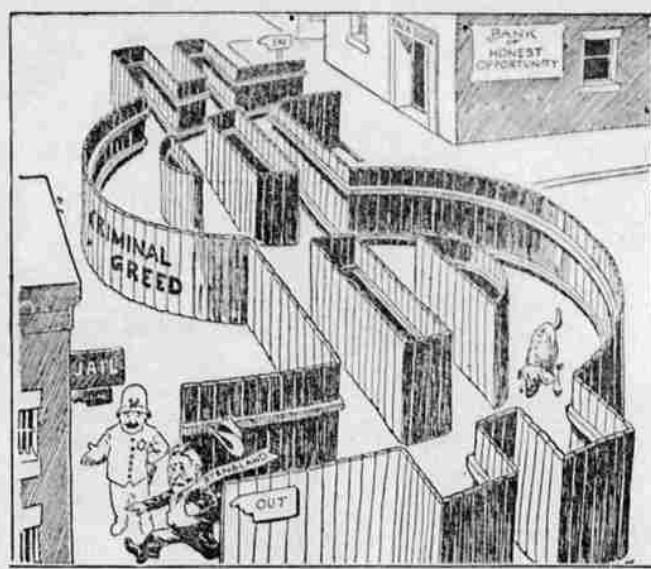

KANSAS CITY SHIPPERS UNDER INDICTMENT FOR TAKING REBATES

Kansas City, Nov. 13.—Indictments were returned by the grand jury today against David H. Kresky, a freight broker, who is charged with conspiracy for violation of the interstate commerce act in securing concessions on shipments of flour to foreign countries over the Chicago & Alton and Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and over the Nickel Plate railroads.

W. A. McGovern was also indicted as agent of the various roads conspiring with Kresky.

Henry S. Hartley, of Kansas City, a dealer in cotton seed mills, was indicted for accepting commissions and rebates on shipments from various points.

Kresky was indicted on December 13, 1905, jointly with several railroads, but the indictment was dismissed.

CHARLES L. VINAL DIED SUNDAY EVENING

Charles Vinal died at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Dr. and Mrs. F. M. Day, corner of West Eleventh and Charnelton streets, Sunday evening, November 11, 1906, aged 78 years and six days. The cause of death was arterio sclerosis and he had been an invalid for several years past.

The deceased was born at Winter-

port, Maine, November 5, 1828. He was a pioneer of Minneapolis, coming West to that city in 1855. He lived there continuously until five years ago, when he came to Eugene to reside. Mrs. Day is his only child.

The funeral was held this forenoon at the Day residence and interment was made in the Masonic cemetery. Rev. D. A. Trimble, pastor of the Methodist church, to which the deceased belonged, conducted the services.



THE PRESIDENT OF THE DISSOLVED DOUMA.

The man who was elected to serve as president of the first parliamentary body ever assembled in Russia is one of the foremost scholars in the empire, Professor Mouroumstseff. The claim of the bureaucracy that the popular demand for legislative representation comes from the ignorant classes and is not supported by men of education and culture has fallen to the ground since the election of Mouroumstseff to preside over the duma. Mme. Mouroumstseff before her marriage was a noted opera singer and still sings admirably.

COUNT WITTE NO LONGER RUSSIAN HERO

Diplomat's Return To St Petersburg Practically Unnoticed - Hope of Legislation Favorable To Jews is Held Out - Well-Known Terrorists Killed By His Intended Victim

St. Petersburg, Nov. 13.—Count Witte's arrival here created scarcely a ripple on the surface of Russian politics, his reception being in great contrast to that after his return from Portsmouth. But a few persons and some reporters welcomed him yesterday and he has had few callers today. Witte declined to be interviewed by newspapermen.

Hope For the Jews.
It is authoritatively stated that measures for relieving the Jews of many of their disabilities will be published as temporary legislation before the convocation of the parliament. The full extent of the proposed reforms is still a matter of discussion with the cabinet, and full settlement of the Jewish problem is left to the parliament.

Assassin Identified.
Moscow, Nov. 13.—The police have identified the man who threw the bomb at General Rheinbot, prefect of police, as one of the notorious Mazury brothers, terrorists, two of whom have been executed, and one other is in prison. Rheinbot killed his would-be assassin.

DELMAS WILL DEFEND THAW IN NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 13.—S. D. M. Delmas, the California lawyer who has been engaged as chief counsel, says Harry Thaw is a nervous wreck. Joseph H. Choate had been approached to secure his services in defense of Thaw, but had declined. John E. Parsons also had declined because of his age. So far as Delmas knows there will be no other New York lawyer engaged on the case, which, according to Delmas, will probably come up for trial in December.

F. M. SMITH FINED \$200 FOR SELLING LIQUOR

Marcola Man Pays for the Unlawful Sale of Booze - Circuit Court Makes Up Virgil Rowland Adultery Case

F. M. Smith, of Marcola, who had pleaded guilty to the charge of selling liquor in violation of the local option law, was this forenoon fined by Judge Harris \$200.
