

WASHINGTON TEAM ARRIVES HERE TODAY

Big Football Game Will Be Played Tomorrow Afternoon--Oregon's Team Will Be Crippled by Absence of Latourette, Hug and Moullen

The Washington football team arrived in Eugene this afternoon, and the postponed game will be played tomorrow afternoon at 2:30. Manager Mount received a telephone message from Portland this morning stating that the team would leave there this morning. They were supposed to arrive in Portland at six o'clock last night but were delayed still longer so that they were unable to catch the night train.

Oregon will go into the game in a crippled condition as Moullen, Hug and Latourette will not be in the first lineup. Washington, however, will also be weakened by her five days' journey, thus putting the teams in equally poor condition. Moullen and Hug may play in case some of the other regular men should be knocked out. Zacharias will take Moullen's end, Pinkham will go from guard to tackle and Grout, a second team man, will probably play guard in Pinkham's position. Gilles is at center and Kuykendall at quarter.

Manager Mount is trying today to get the business houses to close, and considering that the financial loss will be so heavy and the game the last one this season in Eugene, his request will no doubt be granted.

NEW THROUGH TRAIN ON THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC

A third Southern Pacific train will be added to the Portland San Francisco run beginning November 21. This train will provide a daylight trip over the scenic Shasta route.

The train will start from San Francisco at 3:40. It will be a first class passenger with a tourist sleeping car and dining car attached. It will arrive at Portland the following evening at 10:50.

When operating in the opposite direction the train will leave Portland at 11 p. m. and arrive at San Francisco the morning of the second day out at 9:48 o'clock.

This would bring the train into Eugene at about 6:00 p. m. and 3:45 a. m.

TIMBER BOUGHT FOR EUGENE SAWMILL

C. L. Williams, the logging contractor, has just purchased the timber on two tracts of land of 40 and 160 acres respectively, in the Row river country, above Cottage Grove and will at once begin the work of cutting it up into sawlogs for the Eugene Lumber Company's mill in this city.

The 40-acre tract is owned by George Kerr, and the 160-acre tract by Benjamin Hall. For the latter he paid \$550, and for the Hall tract \$900.

Mr. Williams today informed the Guard that the Eugene Lumber Co. will resume the work of shipping logs from the Row river country by rail just as soon as the Southern Pacific company can furnish the cars.
