

# FOOTBALL TEAM OFF FOR CORVALLIS THIS AFTERNOON

Same Lineup Will Play Against Farmers as Played in the Washington Game, Hug, Latourette and Moulien Being Saved For Multnomah Game

The university's football team left on this afternoon's train for Corvallis, where they play the Oregon Agricultural College's team tomorrow. The lineup of the men will be the same as played against Washington. Chandler and Clarke will be able to play, while Hug, Moulien and Latourette will stay out. Coach Bezdek said last night that in case the game proved to be an easy one he might put in one or two second team men, as Hawley at half, in order to save the other men for Multnomah. He said he did not care to express any statement as to the result.

Dr. F. J. Zeigler, captain of the 1900-01 football team, who has been helping Bezdek get ready for the Multnomah game since the Washington victory, said he believed if the field was dry Oregon should win by four touchdowns. If it was as bad a muckhole as reported, it might be a hard matter to score.

Only light practice was indulged in last night. Kuykendall is improving every day, and in case Latourette should not be able to play against Multnomah will fill Jack's shoes satisfactorily.

Only a few students are going to Corvallis Saturday, owing to lack of interest in that game, which most of them feel Oregon will win beyond a doubt. A great crowd of Oregon rooters will be in Portland Thanksgiving to see the Multnomah-Oregon battle.

## Place's Words of Praise

Coach Place, of the University of Washington team, in an interview at Portland after Tuesday's game, said:

"It was the hardest, fastest and cleanest game of football that I have ever witnessed. While we were somewhat knocked out after our long trip, I will state, however, that the better team won. Chandler played like a fiend, and there are few ends in the country today who are his equal. Oregon was always quick to take advantage of every opening, and in this they had it all over the Washington boys. For example, after Oregon had made a long punt, Chandler was down the field in a flash, and when Crim reached for the ball Chandler leaped up, caught it and dashed over the line for a touchdown.

"Oregon is without doubt the strongest college team in the Northwest, and undisputed champions of the Northwest. Pullman, even if it does defeat Whitman, can make no claim for the championship because it played only one college team.

"Oregon's great college spirit is another thing that is a strong factor in winning games, for I have never seen more enthusiasm, even in larger colleges, than is displayed in Oregon. Pullman's spirit is not good, and for that reason Washington has refused to meet the state college.

"The work of the officials was fair and impartial, not one unfair decision being given. Only one penalty was inflicted, and that was on Oregon for holding. Since Washington cannot win the championship, I am glad to see Oregon the victor."
