

THREE THOUSAND CARS NEEDED IN LANE COUNTY

The Portland Telegram's Eugene correspondent, in response to a request for a summary of the car shortage situation here, wired the following yesterday:

The Willamette valley car shortage is seriously affecting the business of the Lane county lumber concerns. The Booth-Kelly Company's big mill at Wending has closed down, forcing 100 men to seek employment elsewhere. The company's Springfield mill is running only in the day time, the night shift having been laid off several months ago, forcing 100 men to seek employment elsewhere. The company at the present time is short 1700 cars, and it is estimated that the total shortage in the county is 3000 cars. The Mohawk Lumber Company's mill has closed down and several other mills are running only part of the time on local orders. A Booth-Kelly official today stated that the situation is worse right now than it has ever been before, with no prospects of betterment for a long time.

H. C. MAHON MAKES MILLION DOLLAR DEAL

H. C. Mahon, of this city, has just closed a deal for the sale of three large tracts of timber land in Oregon, owned by M. B. Rankin, a Portland capitalist, to several Eastern concerns, the sale price being \$1,000,000. One of these tracts lies in Klamath county, another on the Nehalem river and the third in the northwestern part of the state.

Mr. Rankin, who is at the head of the syndicate that recently purchased a 35,000-acre tract of Lane county timber through Mr. Mahon, wired the latter this afternoon that this million-dollar deal had just been completed.
