GOVERNOR'S GOOD REASONS.

Governor Chamberlain over the telephone from Salem told the Portland Journal yesterday why he is of thankful heart. His content is due to the happiness and prosperity of the people of Oregon, the growth and development of the state, the future, with its promises of great good, the past with its pleasant memories of work well done.

"Tell the people of Oregon for me," said now than ever before. I am thankful because they are contented, prosperous and happy. Tell them that my heart is glad because the people of Oregon are in better condition now than ever before. I am thankful because of the present development of the state and its glorious prospects for the future. These things are something for which the whole people should be thankful. The state was never so prosperous. Its people so well cared for, or the promise of the future so bright in good to come. There is no reason for an unthankful heart on this Thanksgiving day. I am thankful because Oregon is happy, contented and on the threshold of years of stupendous development and growth."

TILLMAN'S POINTED TRUTH.

The country needs men, men like Senator Tillman of South Carolina, men fearless in telling the truth. No one with the least acquaintance with the negro will deny the essential truthfulness of this statement made in his Chicago speech Monday:

"God Almighty made the Caucasian of better clay than the Mongolian or the African or any other race. The Ethiopian is a burden-carrier. He has done absolutely nothing for history, nor has he ever achieved anything of great importance. There are no great men among his race. Yet this people has been picked out by the fanatics of the North and lifted up to the equality of citizenship and to the rights of suffrage. No doubt many of us have listened to the oratory of the greatest colored man of this country, Booker T. Washington. He had a white father, however, and out of his brains and his character he has gotten his qualities from his father."

Early in the year conclusive evidence was presented to the government that the New York Central railroad was giving rebates to the American Sugar Refining Company. What did the courts do with these big bug multi-millionaire corporations? Did nothing for months—have just fined them \$18,000 each! A nickel fine would have been an effective so far as its punitive power might go. A half million or a million fine would make these autocrats pause in their violation of law.

A St. Louis dispatch giving news of the finding of two indictments in the federal court against the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, says the maximum penalties on all the counts of the indictments aggregate over a million dollars. Just the same it will be a surprise if they are fined twenty thousand dollars in case of conviction. The great New York Central railroad was "fined" \$18,000 the other day for most outrageous and persistent violation of the interstate commerce law. The people should have a chance at those federal judges. If elected like other judges the judicial career of such subservient judges would be brought to a sudden close at the election following their corporation decisions.

That San Francisco earthquake and rebuilding of the devastated city has changed conditions over the entire coast—for the better for some, for the worse for others. While it has brought a big demand and better prices for lumber and other construction building materials, there is not a little bitter with the sweet in the car shortage and inability of the railroads to handle the traffic. Of course San Francisco is the traffic congested point, thousands of freight cars standing there for weeks awaiting unloading. And the whole coast suffers from lack of adequate transportation facilities.

From almost everywhere west of the Rocky Mountains comes the same tale of suffering from lack of fuel on account of the inability of the railroads to move it. Even Los Angeles that we have been so often told has a summery winter climate, has to shiver and admit the truth. The southern city needs wood and coal and needs it bad. They call it an "enormous cold spell." That, of course, is just because they are out of fuel.

Sauvies' Island, below Portland, is a great duck hunting place, besides being the location of not a few nice farms. In the recent high water a considerable number of geese were drowned, in explanation of which a Portland humorist avers that the hides of the geese killed were so full of duck shot by the peppering they had undergone for years that they sunk like fish line sinkers.
