CHURCHES HOLD THANKSGIVING UNION SERVICES

Meeting Held at First Christian Church This Forenoon—Rev. D. H. Trimble, of Methodist Church, Delivered Annual Sermon and Various Pastors Assisted in the Service

The large auditorium of the First Christian church was well filled this forenoon at 10:30 o'clock, the time set for the beginning of the union Thanksgiving services. The services were interesting and impressive, the program of hymns and anthems being well arranged and in good hands. Rev. J. S. McCallum, pastor of the church, presided at the services. Rev. E. C. Oakley, pastor of the First Congregational church, opened the services with an invocation and Rev. H. N. Mount, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church, read the scripture lesson. Rev. O. C. Wright, pastor of the Baptist church, offered prayer, and Rev. Geo. E. McDonald, pastor of the United Brethren church, read the president's Thanksgiving proclamation.

Then came the annual Thanksgiving sermon by Rev. Delmer H. Trimble, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church. He chose for his text Psalms cxvi:12-14, and spoke in part as follows:

This is Dependence Day. Our great national festival we term Independence Day, celebrating our emancipation from all foreign interference and restraint. Today we acknowledge our utter dependence on God and helplessness except He be with us. For what are our silver and our gold, territory or timber, gifts, talents or industry if He withhold the blessing of His hands? Let the rain or the sun or the life-giving principle of the seed be withheld for a single year and famine, starvation and death would stare us in the face.

First we should render to the Lord for His benefit a thankful spirit. The people with a trust and confidence in God whom you meet by the concourse of life evidencing it by a smiling face, bring sunshine through the Oregon fog and cause a rise in the thermometer of twenty degrees on the coldest morning.

The people who in the ordinary routine of life see its blessings and treasure them up as a boon for which to thank God are a benediction to the house and the community. The people of the opposite spirit, complaint, criticism, ingratitude—what a contrast! "In fine health at this morning?" "Yes, but I never enjoy myself when in good health, for I may be sick tomorrow." "Tremendous crop of fruit this year?" "Yes, but it's going to break down the trees." "Tremendous crop of small grain this year?" "Yes, but don't you know it is desperately hard on the land?" Some people make themselves so miserable that hell won't be much of a change for them. They have it already. All they need is the fire—they carry the brimstone. But our God is looking for thankful hearts.

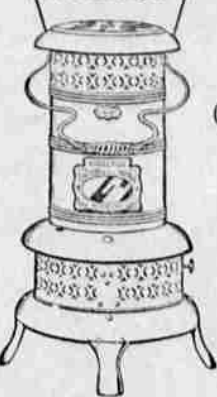
Second, we should render to the Lord for His benefit a use and not an abuse of His material blessings. We are the youngest among the nations, out the richest of them all. The financial centre of the world is New York, not London.

Our material wealth has doubled in the last fifteen years. If Midas and Croesus were alive they would be bringing up the rear of the procession and experience some difficulty in keeping out of the poorhouse. This is the most remarkable era of prosperity that we have known as a nation, and this year we have reached the highest point in that era. As a town we are destined to be the best city in the state except one. At the forks of the Willamette, the products of field, forest and mine from the south must pass our doors. We are in that depression between the mountains from east to west through which a transcontinental line must run in the near future. We have the best country in the state and with such diversified industries as lumbering, agriculture, horticulture, stock raising, and mining. The business men are happy, the farmers are prosperous, the dollars are plentiful—will we use them in making better men and women? Or will we become so enamored of their glitter that in the race for their possession that we will have no time for the making of the man.

No man is advancing in real life who is not weaving the material into the warp and woof of spiritual character and personal soul. He only is advancing in life whose heart is getting softer, his blood warmer, his brain keener, and his spirit entering into living peace. Let us not abuse God's gifts.

Third, we should pay our vows to God. In the time of your trouble you called on the Lord and He heard your prayer. Then with bowed head and subdued heart you promised to serve Him. Some member of your home—the light of your life and your hope—He gave you back from the grave. Face to face with death by accident He saved you. Financial ruin staring you in the face He intervened in your behalf. Or have you been exceptionally prosperous during the past year—for these causes or some other you vowed to God that you'd be true. Have you paid your vow—have you repented him at all? Have you been a man in this? Have you told others of His goodness? Are you in debt to God for that which you have solemnly promised Him during the past year? Pay your vows unto the Most High.

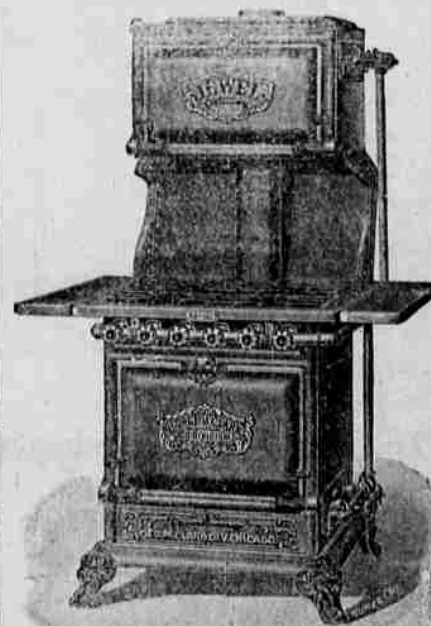
