Portland Market Report.
Portland, Nov. 29.—Turkeys, live and dressed; ducks and chickens continued up to today to come in quite heavily, but dealers generally reported a good demand. Dressed turkeys were bringing about the same price quoted for some days with fancy birds a shade stronger. Market yesterday, 20¢@21c, with every probability of holding through the day.

The big retailers picked large stocks yesterday and this morning, and with pretty good outside orders this morning and sales locally in moderate volume, the opinion is held among commission houses that little trouble will be met with in getting stocks down to normal by tomorrow evening.
The leading retail markets report a much heavier sale of turkeys yesterday than on the corresponding day last year. Retail prices ruled around 25¢ per pound for common to good, up to 28¢@30c for fancy young turkeys.

City Creameries Advance Butter.
Some of the city creameries advanced the price of their first-grade butter yesterday to 32½¢, but the other leading concerns did not announce the advance till this morning, Tuesday being their regular day for issuing price-current. The quotation is now held by practically all the city creameries, with the buying price of butter fat 31c. A very heavy trade north was interrupted just when an advance was contemplated. Now that the railroads are in shape to handle this outside demand, it is found that, together with some falling off in cream, the market naturally goes up.

Hop Market Active.
Buying in the hop market is assuming larger proportions. Quite a heavy trade is going on among dealers, and as a consequence there pops up the customary bearish talk. Dealers in the field continue to take on offerings at prices ruling for the past two weeks.

RECORD-BREAKING SEASON FOR THE VINEGAR PLANT

Three Thousand Barrels More Manufactured This Year Than During Any Previous Year—New Equipment to Be Installed—Medford Factory Will Be Moved

E. H. Ingham, of the Ingham Vinegar Company, has just returned from Medford, where he had been looking after the work of closing the season's run at the company's vinegar factory in that city.

Mr. Ingham informs the Guard that his company will abandon the factory at Medford and will soon ship the machinery either to Portland or Tacoma, where a plant will soon be established.

The company's Eugene factory will not be moved, as was the intention several months ago, as the business this year has been very good and warrants the operation of the plant on a much larger scale. The capacity will be once increased, new vats and new machinery will be installed and by the time next season begins the plant will be able to take care of a great deal more business than heretofore.

Mr. Ingham informs the Guard that 2000 more barrels of vinegar have been manufactured this year than during any previous year and apples have not yet ceased coming in. It will be several weeks before the season closes.

This is one of Eugene's leading manufacturing industries and is a means of distributing thousands of dollars among the farmers annually, besides paying a large amount of money for labor.

AMUSEMENTS

"Peggy from Paris" has come and gone again, and scored a greater hit than she did at the time of her previous visit. The piece as a whole was put on better than it was before and the costumes were perhaps more elaborate. Anyway, we enjoyed it more than we did before and could enjoy it perhaps still better if it were repeated tonight. A good many of the old characters are still with the troupe and as they appeared on the stage they were recognized and each given an ovation. Reginald Hickey, the "useful boy," was there again with his up-to-date slang and tough manners, and was perhaps the most interesting character in the whole bunch. Arthur Deagon carries this role and does it handily. Olivette Haynes, as Sophia Blotz, Mlle. Carmelle's German maid, made a greater hit than before, and Minnie Olton as Mrs. Montague Fish was the same with all her ugliness. The other parts were all good and the choruses seemed to please everybody.

The high school and Columbia football teams occupied the box seats and in their honor several of the players wore "E" and "C. U." armlets. The "Oregon" pennant was also displayed and this brought forth the 'varsity yell from the students in attendance.
The Salt Lake City Republican of November 27 said of the Boston Sextette, which appears at the Eugene theatre, under the auspices of the University School of Music:
"Probably the greatest interest centred in the soprano, Shanna Cumming, whose reputation had preceded her to the West, and whose strikingly handsome personality pleased the eye quite as much as the pure liquid notes which charmed the ear. Mrs. Cumming's voice is a dramatic soprano of exceptional sweetness and power, and has in it a touch of the lyric quality that goes straight to the hearts of her listeners. With but one exception her songs were in the English tongue and the clearness of her enunciation made it a delight to hear her, even to those the least versed in music.
"Her first selection, 'Je Suis Titania,' from the opera 'Mignon,' gave opportunity for the display of the range of her wonderful voice, and the beautiful aria of Thomas was never heard to better advantage. She responded with one verse of Jocelyn's Berceuse, which charmed the audience even more than did the French selection. At her second appearance she sang three little songs, 'Rose Leans Over the Pool,' by Chadwick; 'Songs My Mother Taught Me,' by Dvorak, and 'Spring Song,' by Well. The selections and the manner of their rendition captivated the audience completely, and Mrs. Cumming was forced to respond with an old favorite melody, 'Bonnie Sweet Bessie.' After that the crowd, though by no means satiated, reluctantly gave over and allowed her to leave the stage.
"Cellist Was Popular.
"Sharing the honors with the singer was the cellist, Mr. Carl W. Stockbridge, who drew tones of unbelievable sweetness from his instrument. Mr. Stockbridge rendered the 'Serenade Bardine' by Marie and was forced to respond to an encore, to his apparent discomfort, and to the unmeasured delight of the audience.
"Mr. Louis Eaton, the violinist, played 'Zikenerweisen,' by Sarasate, very acceptably, and Mr. C. L. Staats rendered a clarinet solo, a fantasia by Paradis, in a most pleasing manner.
The Sextette came in for a large share of the popular favor. The instrumentation presented an almost perfect balance, and the selections, ranging from classical to modern light opera, were played with rare precision and charm. The selection from Gounod's 'Romeo and Juliet' delighted the more critical portion of the audience, and the final number, a selection from Victor Herbert's 'The Fortune Teller,' won unstinted praise from those who love music of a lighter character."
