The prima donna soprano is well-known to Portlanders and her admirers were out in force to give her a welcome and to listen to her glorious voice. While suffering with a slight cold, she did not allow it to interfere with her singing, and gave some beautifully rendered solos which called for delicate coloratura work. Upon her appearance she was tendered an ovation which came from the hearts of the many friends who sat before her, and she sang her appreciation in return.

"As an encore to her first number, the Aria from 'Mignon,' Miss Cumming sang 'Rejoice Greatly,' from the 'Messiah,' playing her own accompaniment. Her playing was almost as enjoyable as he singing in this instance, and the audience would not let her go without a second encore. For this she gave a beautiful rendition of 'Strauss' 'Serenade.' In her second group of songs, the first, 'Rose Leans Over the Pool,' was one of the most refreshing and delicate bits of vocalism one could wish for.
