

SECOND DAY OF BIG
Y. M. C. A. CONVENTION

Permanent Organization Com-
pleted at Last Night's
Session

Banquet Will Be Held Tonight and
Men's Meeting Tomorrow.
Address by Mr. Holmes, of
Wellington, New Zealand, a
Feature of Today's Meeting

The Y. M. C. A. convention which
is being held in Eugene today and
tomorrow, is fully under way, and
from the promise of Friday and to-
day, will be one of the most highly
satisfactory assemblies ever held by
the associations of the Oregon-Idaho
district. Friday's work concerned
the organization, and the more serious
work of the convention was not
taken up until today.

The nominating committee for per-
manent organization brought in their
nominations last night at the Metho-
dist church, and the following offi-
cers were immediately elected: Chair-
man, J. H. Albert, Salem; vice-
chairman, F. R. Parcellus, Pocatello,
Idaho; second vice-chairman, Pres.
A. L. Briggs, Oregon State Central
Normal School, Drain; secretary, J.
C. Clarke, Portland.

One of the prime objects that seem
to permeate the speakers is the suc-
cess of the city Y. M. C. A. in Eu-
gene.

The backers of the movement
are receiving encouragement from
the delegates, and after its close will
be able to go back to their work
with renewed strength and effort.

The object of the convention is to
increase the interest in Y. M. C. A.
work in the various associations in
the district by bringing together rep-
resentatives from each, and acquaint-
ing them with the work in other
places and fields. Business pertain-
ing to the general association is, of
course, also taken up.

Banquet Tonight.

The chief feature of today is the
banquet which will be tendered the
delegates by the university Y. M. C.
A. and the Ladies' Aid societies of
the various churches of Eugene. This
is a distinctive feature of the Y. M.
C. A. banquets, for here the members
who are present enjoy their playtime,
as it were. The feast will be given
in the rooms below the Commercial
club.

Men's Meeting Sunday.

The chief meeting tomorrow will
be the men's meeting at the opera
house in the afternoon at 3 o'clock.
The Eugene orchestra will furnish
music, and a male quartet composed
of Messrs. Prescott, Neal, McClain
and Davis will sing. At the same
time a boys' meeting will be held by
H. W. Stone, of the Portland Y. M.
C. A., in the Methodist church.

This Morning's Session.

After a brief song service the con-
vention opened this morning with
Bible study under the leadership of
W. H. Holmes, of Wellington, New
Zealand. This morning the number
of delegates had increased from 100
to 120 by arrivals last night from
both north and south.

The prevailing subject of the morning
was Bible study, and H. W. Davis,
of the Portland association, deliv-
ered the first formal address on
"What Are We to Accomplish by Our
Bible Study?"

He considered a number of things
that should be done and the results.
The main thought, however, was the
effect of systematic study of the
Bible, and how the Y. M. C. A. classes
excelled in that part of the work.

Following a brief discussion of the
preceding address Professor H. D.
Sheldon, of the University of Oregon,
spoke on the subject, "The Bible
Study Leaders' Training Class." He
demonstrated the great value of
these classes in their relation to the
student classes, and the great neces-
sity for them in each and every as-
sociation. He also took up the meth-
ods of conducting the Bible leaders'
study and explained them very
thoroughly.

Owing to the fact that Chas. D.
Hurrey, international secretary of the
Y. M. C. A., was delayed and unable
to arrive here before tonight, the
address on "Evangelistic Work in
Our College Associations" was omit-
ted, and the business of the session
at once taken up.

Each association, with a few ex-
ceptions, reported, giving the condi-
tion of their work, which almost uni-
versally showed a material growth.
In the Oregon-Idaho district there
are seventeen associations, with a
total membership of over 3,100, di-
vided as follows:

Bates' Reports.

Prof. H. L. Bates, of Pacific Uni-
versity and a member of the state
executive committee, reported on the
work in the Northwest as a whole.
In regard to the railroad work at
Pocatello, Idaho, where there are 650
members, he said that a crucial crisis
had come. The Oregon Short Line

are putting up a large club house for
the use of their men in competition
with the railway Y. M. C. A. there,
and on the result of the success of
the Y. M. C. A. Association at that
point depends to a large degree al-
over the country the attitude of the
railroad companies.

Other lines of work were also re-
ported, and in the main showed con-
siderable progress. The report was
referred to the committee on the
state executive board for acceptance
or rejection.

The treasurer's report, Geo. Mur-
ton, of Portland, was next read and
referred to the auditing committee.
The assets were shown to be in ac-
cess of the liabilities by \$537.

Big Subscription.

In fifteen minutes before noon time
and the closing of the morning ses-
sion, \$1,250 of pledges was raised
inside of the building. Of this
amount \$713 was by personal sub-
scription, and \$537 on behalf of the
different associations by their repre-
sentatives.

Short Addresses.

After the address of F. R. Pargel-
lis a number of short talks were
made by Y. M. C. A. workers of the
coast. J. C. Clark of the Portland
Y. M. C. A., related something con-
cerning the work among the boys
by the Y. M. C. A., and of the meth-
ods used to hold their interest.

H. W. Davis, also of the Portland
Y. M. C. A., spoke on "The Young
Men's Bible Classes."

B. B. Wilcox followed with a short
address on the "Corresponding Mem-
ber," and G. A. Roberts, of O. A. C.,
talked of "Student Vacation Work."

Ivan B. Rhodes, state secretary of
Oregon, closed the formal program
with a speech on "The Investment of
Life."

Yesterday Afternoon.

After the splendid address of H.
W. Stone yesterday afternoon on
"The purposes of the Y. M. C. A., and
How Accomplished," B. B. Wilcox,
state secretary of California, address-
ed the convention on "The Organi-
zation of the Association."

He began with the first steps in
founding the association, especially
in the cities. While dwelling on this
phase of the subject, he gave some
splendid advice to the backers of the
Eugene city association. Then he
went to the organization of each as-
sociation, explaining in detail the
various ways and methods of get-
ting the best results in the young
men's work.

Mr. Holmes, general secretary of
the Y. M. C. A., Wellington, New
Zealand, was introduced and told
something of the work in the South
Pacific.

He showed how great was the need
for the modern methods in Austr-
alia, where there are cities of 600,000
population, as Melbourne and Sid-
ney, with only one lone secretary.
There are no subdivisions in the
work in Australia, and the want of
more money and men is imperative.

New Zealand is a little better off,
as in the last year nearly \$400,000
has been raised at Wellington. The
new success is due to the adaptation
of American methods.

Last Evening's Meeting.

The evening session Friday opened
with the usual song service, after
which I. H. Amos addressed the
assembly of 400 people on "The Value
of an Association to the People." He
took the phase which had been as-
signed to Tom Richardson, who was
unable to reach Eugene in time on
account of a delay in the East,
where he has been for the last ten
days.

The view taken by the speaker
was the commercial value of the as-
sociation to a town. He showed very
conclusively how any town or city
gains immeasurably by supporting a
Y. M. C. A. organization. His talk
dealt more particularly with Port-
land, but the same results could be
easily attained in any other city.

Illustrated Talk.

The last address of the evening
and day was by B. B. Wilcox, state
secretary of California, and consist-
ed of a lecture illustrated by graphic
views of the Y. M. C. A. works.

The subject showed the value of
an association to a city as a religious
and social force. The work in the
cities, in the army and navy, among
railway men and colleges were all
considered.
