In his attempt to simplify the English language, President Roosevelt was careful not to eliminate the personal pronoun "I." Without it he would find the construction of his daily special message to congress impossible.

What sort of a city council have they in Portland? Mayor Lane has just had the pleasure of vetoing an ordinance permitting the employment of women in saloons. Whatever ever may be thought of men frequenting such places, no one with even the least knowledge of saloon surroundings but will say that in all decency women should be kept out.

The friction between church and state in France is responsible for queer funeral conditions in the small town of La Canonique. Both church and town own hearses and it takes them both for a funeral—the town authorities refusing the church hearse permission to use the streets, while the town hearse is similarly barred out of the churchyard, all doubling the cost of that part of the last rites.

There is one recommendation in the message of the president that is of interest to all sections, and that is in connection to the formation of rifle clubs throughout the country, to become efficient in the use of the government rifle. This is a manly sport while it perfects the members in the use of the gun that will be used in case of war, and will make them more efficient should they join the army. It is not only a healthful sport, but is patriotic as well.

Cardinal Gibbons says that charges of cruelties and atrocities in the Congo Free State are greatly exaggerated through commercial and religious jealousies. He says he is closely in touch with the situation there and does not speak unadvisedly. He intimates that the charges of maladministration by Belgium are made in the interest of stronger powers who will be glad of any excuse which will allow them to get possession of the territory so rich in natural resources.

The work already cut out for the interstate commerce commission is so heavy that there is some prospect congress will provide for additional members. In that case, or should a vacancy occur from any other cause, it is reported that the friends of W. D. Barr, of Chicago, general freight and passenger agent of the Chicago Terminal Transfer Railroad Company, will urge his appointment. For Mr. Barr it is claimed that he is a practical railroad man of large experience and admirably qualified in every way for a place on the commission.

President Roosevelt's comparison of the steam shovels and dump cars used by the French and Americans on the Panama canal, to the great disparagement of the former, of course, is not entirely just to the former. De Lesseps commenced actual work on the great canal in October, 1881, twenty-five years ago. That quarter of a century has witnessed most remarkable improvements in all classes of machinery; besides, we have the experience of the French to aid us. Our opportunities compared to theirs are almost as those of man to boy. The French dumped great sums of money into the big ditch. With the estimated cost of \$300,000,000, about \$280,000,000 had been expended when the company collapsed, with but a small portion of the work done.

The Commercial Club should take up the matter of opening the Willamette river as far as Eugene. It is an entirely feasible idea—one that might be carried out within two years if the proper effort is made to interest the Oregon delegation in congress. To secure an appropriation of \$250,000 with which to begin the work should not be a difficult task when the importance of the work is considered. The Willamette river drains the most thickly settled portion of the Willamette valley, a territory capable of vast development which in time will greatly increase its population and commercial importance. Some boats have already been brought up the river as far as Eugene without any river improvement, having been done, and it would seem that the task of making it safely navigable should not be one of great difficulty or expense.

Resources of Lane. (Roseburg Review.) A fine 32-page industrial number has just been issued by the Eugene Guard. It includes numerous illustrations further portraying the advancement and industries of Eugene and Lane county. A page is devoted to the Bohemia mining district and an adequate amount of space is occupied by the great timber industry of that county. Lane county claims a larger quantity of merchantable timber than any other county in the United States, Douglas being a close second. The various other industries are also adequately set forth, as well as the fine school facilities and other institutions. An increase of 12 per cent in postoffice business and nearly 50 per cent in bank deposits during the past year are indisputable evidences of prosperous growth. This edition of the Guard is a very creditable one and should be of vast benefit to that portion of our state.

Jacksonville's public school building has been destroyed by fire. Loss, \$15,000; insurance, \$10,000.

Robert Whitney, father of Lincoln Whitney, for whose murder Orlando Murray was acquitted in Portland, died at Woodburn Friday as a result of the shock given him by the tragedy. He was an Oregon pioneer.
