The more we hear about some of the other senators the better we like Tillman.

A Kentuckian sold at auction for a period of ten months brought only \$10. Evidently he was no colonel.

The man who once borrowed \$30 from Uncle Russell Sage is dead. This was his one and only claim to fame, but it was enough.

"Taft holds first place in the president's heart," says a press item. This bears out the assertion that Mr. Roosevelt is a very large hearted man.

Booker Washington must find it hard to keep in with his own people and yet defend his great and good friend, Ted, in discharging the colored battalion.

First buy the Oregon City locks order to secure free navigation and then open the river to Eugene. That is the only way to solve the Western Oregon transportation question right—and all big questions should be settled right.

Secretary Metcalf, of the department of Commerce and labor, went all the way to San Francisco to find out there was a prejudice against Japanese—at least that is about all his report amounts to. He might as well have stayed at home, for Pacific coast people admit that prejudice. And the better they know the Asiatics the greater their prejudice.

Senator Hale, of Maine, says war in its broad sense—pensions for the past and current expenditures of the army and navy—takes two-thirds of all the money the government receives. The sword is not being forged into plowshares nor the spear into pruning hooks, while the nations continue to learn and do war with a vengeance. Considered with regard to nations, the commandment about the taking of human life might well be changed to "Thou shalt kill." Then it would accord with practice.

The need of a fire alarm system was illustrated in Eugene today. An alarm was telephoned to the department from "Seventh and Madison," and it was understood by the firemen as "Eleventh and Patterson," two miles from the scene of the fire. Naturally, before the mistake could be corrected the house burned down. Eugene is becoming quite a large town and mistakes like this, which a modern fire alarm system would obviate, are likely to prove altogether too frequent.

General John B. Pershing, another of the military heroes who, like General Funston, have risen rapidly in fame and rank, is likely to have a hard fight on his hands for confirmation as a major general. His brother officers in the Philippines object to moral weaknesses of this administration favors. The Manila American asserts that Pershing, while in the Philippines lived with a Filipino woman, Joquina Bonoy Ignacio, who bore him two children. One child

died in the cholera epidemic of 1902; the other, who is named Petronilla, and is 4 1/2 years old, lives with her mother in Zaunboagna. The mother is now the legal wife of William Shinn, clerk at the Moro government headquarters. Pershing's brother officers have decided to present his record to the senate when the question of his confirmation comes up.

A writer in the Scientific American makes a strong plea for the preservation of the Salton Sea, the new physical feature of southeastern California created by the Colorado river breaking its bank during a freshet last spring and pouring its waters into a great contiguous basin some fifty miles in diameter and below the sea level. The Southern Pacific railroad has already spent a million dollars trying to build a bank that will hold the river, but without avail. There is little question but the railroad will have to build around the new lake. And it may well afford to, as the past season has shown a greatly modified climate with abundance of rain in the contiguous desert territory where before without exception there was little or no rainfall.

The Cunard steamers now being built, and which it is expected will be ready for service next summer, will stand at the fore of the ocean greyhounds that ply the Atlantic. They are expected to develop 68,000 horsepower each and a speed of 25 1/2 knots. To move these vast masses of iron (88 feet beam and 785 long) will require great power. To supply this each vessel will be furnished with twenty-five boilers, seventeen feet in diameter and twenty-one feet long. Four great smokestacks 17x24 feet and 150 high will furnish draft and carry off the gases and smoke from the thousand tons of coal burned every 24 hours. Night and day several hundred firemen will shovel coal into the 192 furnaces burning at a white heat under forced draught. The 68,000 horsepower of each steamer's turbines will equal the combined horsepower of thirty-two powerful freight locomotives.

For an Open Waterway.

(Salem Statesman.)
In an editorial illustrating and emphasizing the value of an open waterway in solving the problems of transportation and development of resources, the Eugene Guard advocates either the clearing of the Willamette river of snags and other obstacles to navigation all the way to that city, or the digging of a canal from Eugene to a navigable point down the stream. The Guard says: "Much good will come from the remedial legislation asked for by the late car shortage convention held in Eugene, and The Guard will give to all remedial legislation its hearty support. But The Guard sees beyond the need of cars to move our present congested products. It sees need of water transportation, and believes that intelligent, united action by the people of Eugene and Lane county can accomplish it. Whether it can be best obtained by dredging and removing the snags from the Willamette river, or by a canal from Eugene to navigable water on the river, is the question for engineers to determine. One or the other we must have."

The result to Eugene, made possible by such a combination of improvements is thus foreshadowed: "Give to Eugene forty miles of canal, or by dredging and other improvements make the Willamette river navigable to this point, and Eugene will have an open waterway of 300 miles to the sea, its steamers will, in the not far distant future, navigate the upper Columbia, through and past the state of Washington and into British Columbia, and Eugene will become a great manufacturing city if, indeed, not the greatest on the Pacific Coast."

Fishing on the Siuslaw.

(The Florence West.)

There is an ambiguity in the state law relating to fishing on the Siuslaw river that should be remedied by the next legislature. The law, at present prohibits fishing in the Siuslaw river, except with rod and line, above Mapleton. It does not specify what is meant by Mapleton, whether it refers to Mapleton precinct, Mapleton townsite, Mapleton store, or some other point in that vicinity. In the summer of 1905, the state fish warden had notices posted up saying that Mapleton, as used in that law, would be held to mean the town site of Mapleton, as platted by F. C. Bean. Last fall a man was arrested on the charge of violating this law and a trial was held in the justice court in Florence. The justice of the peace placed the same construction on the law as does the state fish warden, but the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty, holding that the law is not sufficiently definite to justify a conviction. The legislature should amend the law so as to make the meaning clear. There is also some difference of opinion of opinion as to how far down the river fishing with nets should be prohibited. Some are in favor of establishing the line at or near the town site of Mapleton, while others think it should be about the upper line of Captain Steer's ranch. Those holding the latter opinion reason in this way: Above the town of Mapleton the river is quite shallow and when the water is at its lowest stage few salmon will ascend the stream above the rapids, but they remain in tide water and are caught in the nets without depositing their spawn. A short distance below Mapleton there are a number of deep places in the river channel and if fishing were prohibited there these would afford hiding places for the salmon where they could lie in safety till the water rises enough so they could reach their spawning ground on the gravel bars and small tributaries above the head of tide. Some people hold that a resting place of this kind would be of more benefit than the hatchery is to the fishing industry. While we do not hold that opinion, we think that it would be a great help to the work of artificial propagation and would do a great deal toward keeping up the fishing industry on this river.
