The Eugene Commercial Club is to begin working for a government appropriation of \$250,000 to open the Willamette so boats can pass as far as that city. That is certainly ambitious, and indicates a confidence that is commendable.

Linn county wants only what is right.

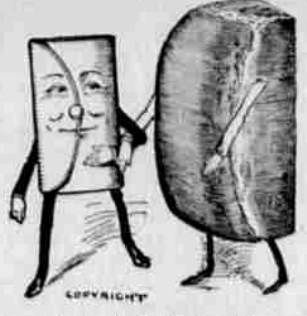
