ANOTHER REGIMENT OF O. N. G.

Prospects Bright for Establishment of Eight-Company Regiment With Headquarters at Eugene and to Be Known as the Fourth - Major Yorlan May Be Colonel

Prospects are now bright for the establishment in the near future of a new regiment of the Oregon National Guard, to be known as the Fourth, with headquarters at Eugene.

The new regiment will comprise Companies A and C, of Eugene, Co. B at Roseburg, Co. D at Ashland, and four new companies to be organized at as many cities in the western part of the state.

At present there is one full regiment, the Third, and two separate battalions in the state, the Eugene companies belonging to the First Separate Battalion.

The Guard learns from a reliable source that the new regiment is almost a certainty, and that it will be established during the coming spring or summer. Major Geo. O. Yorlan, of this city, who is commander of the First Separate Battalion, will doubtless be chosen colonel of the new regiment.
