SAME OLD TROUBLE.

The Guard has during the past few weeks apologized for the lateness of its publication in the evening so many times that it has become an old story to ourselves as well as to our readers. An attempt to make a worthless press, sold to us by a New York firm, print the paper has been the principal cause of trouble, and has only been tolerated by a desire to give the machine the fairest possible trial before carting it to the scrap heap.

Yesterday, after a complete breakdown of two weeks, the press was set to work again and an attempt made to print the Guard in this office with the usual disastrous result, the press breaking before the edition was fairly under way.

The only reason we are trying to repair the press at all is to enable us to use it temporarily while we are buying and installing a new press to take its place, this being a transaction that requires careful consideration, as we wish to avoid the repetition of our troubles of this year, something that we cannot do if we purchase hastily again.

THE CONFEDERATE ROSTER.

Under an act of congress passed in 1903 the war department has since been busy compiling the Confederate part of the roster of officers and enlisted men who took part on both sides in the Civil War. It is proving a difficult work, owing to the incomplete Confederate records in the possession of the war department.

Records of the states are being used—in former years from Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia and Kentucky, and latterly the records of confederate organizations in Mississippi, Texas, North Carolina and Virginia have been loaned to help out.

Now Union records of Confederate prisoners are being used to make the roster as complete as possible. Up to date the whole number of index record cards prepared from the Confederate roster is 3,360,441.

United States Senator Blackburn says Bryan is easily the strongest man for the Democratic nomination in 1908. He says, too that Roosevelt and Hearst were eliminated by the New York state election November 6 when, with the exception of Hearst for governor, the state went Democratic. Senator Blackburn has no use for Hearst. He says: "I am frank to say that I am well pleased with the result in New York, especially with reference to Mr. Hearst. His election unquestionably would have been disastrous to the Democratic party, for with the machinery of the great state of New York in his hands for two years, with his liberal means of publicity and almost unlimited wealth, he would have built up a machine powerful enough to seriously cripple, if he did not do greater harm to it."

The Oregonian says the relations of General Pershing with the Filipino woman over in the Philippines was a sin against his posterity. But

it improved his posterity, presuming that the Filipino half breed is not akin to the Indian article, which is well described as possessing the vices of both and the virtues of neither. The trouble with the half breeds is there is no place in the social economy for them. They hold themselves above the inferior half of their blood, only to be denied recognition by the people of the superior strain. There being no place for them the men become criminals, more dangerous, too, on account of their superior brain inherited from the white directing the craft of the Indian, while the women, who as a rule make expert needle women and housekeepers, too often fall into the brothel.

Why will not Lane county build a bridge at the free ferry on the McKenzie? It needs it, there is a great deal of travel on the road and it is not only delayed by periodical high water for several days at a time on occasion, but when operated there are long waits for the traveler at times on account of the rush. The great timber and mining interests of the McKenzie, not to mention travel across the mountains and to and from the hot springs, are responsible for travel on the road really above the capacity of a ferry to properly handle. The Guard suggests that the Commercial Club take this matter up with our county court. A bridge should span the McKenzie at the ferry site before the rains come next fall.

In case of the men in the street-car strike in Portland there is a question about the employees who stayed with the company, refusing to strike, holding their places. Here is how a conductor looks at the situation: "I stayed," said he, "not out of love for the company, and so it owes me no debt of gratitude, and I cannot expect to hold my job simply because I served as a strikebreaker. To remain with the company was simply a business proposition with me, and I suppose it will be a business matter with the company to let me out if the union wins. There are others like me. It's all fair—just commercialism, that's all."

That the spelling of not a few words of our language could be changed to conform to sound with great advantage will not be questioned. But how? The president at this short interval from the issuance of his recent message in which he reformed the spelling of a few words—that is, reformed them to his own liking—is forced to admit failure to convert the public to his way of doing it.

The Japanese may lower wages in competition with our white labor, but in one case Japanese competition is proving beneficial to a large class of our people—the wheatgrowers. Commencing January 1 the rates on wheat and flour to Asiatic ports will be reduced fifty cents a ton, consequent on the establishment of the Japanese line. Fifty cents a ton of 33 1/3 bushels off carrying charges means a cent and a half a bushel more to the grower.

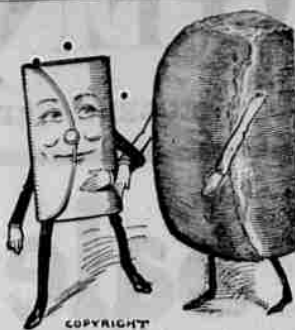
