THE ONLY RIGHT WAY

PULLING TOGETHER FOR EUGENE.

The Commercial Club and Merchants' Protective Association are showing commendable activity for the good of the city. The movement for a \$100,000 postoffice building is the proper thing, and their efforts for an open river to Eugene will bear fruit in time if persevered in.

We are glad to note that the morning paper has come out for the open river movement, along the line suggested by The Guard. It is the only true solution of the transportation problem, and when accomplished, will assure this city commercial importance. It may require some time and considerable effort to secure the necessary aid from the federal government, but keeping everlastingly at it will bring a success well worth while.

Since the purchase of Alaska in 1867 the United States has received as revenue from the lease of the sealing privilege on the Pribiloff Islands more than nine million dollars, or two millions more than we paid for the territory. The trade in skins on the Pribiloff by Americans since the purchase of Alaska exceeds fifty million dollars in value. During the winter of 1905-06 the department of commerce and labor captured 456 blue and 11 white foxes on the St. George Island.

NEW MECHINERY FOR BLACK BUTTE

The Electrochemical and Metallurgical Industry Magazine for November contained an exhaustive article on W. R. Dennis, of Black Butte, new mercury furnace, and his process of distillation. The patents as applied for are a process patent and an apparatus patent, and are both defined as processes entirely new in the distillation of ores. The new furnaces being constructed on the principle as outlined will be put in operation within a few months. Considerable delay is being encountered in getting the large tile to cover the floor of the condenser, as they are of an unusually large size. The electric power plant will be installed in the spring, and by that time Assistant Superintendent Cooper expects to have the new ore houses, crushers, mills, etc., all ready for operation. W. R. Dennis is in New York attending to the affairs of the company at that end.
