BILLY HEARST GOING AFTER M' CLELLAN'S JOB

First Papers Filed With New Attorney General Ara in Contest - New Laws in Effect Today - Governor Hughes Takes Oath of Office at Albany Today

Albany, Jan. 1.—The first paper served on the new attorney general, Jackson, today was an application for a rehearing on the petition of Wm. Randolph Hearst for leave to begin warrant proceedings to test the title of George B. McClellan to the office of mayor of New York City, of which Hearst claims he has been deprived by fraud and violence in the election of 1905.

Washington, Jan. 1.—Today marks the beginning of the life of several legislative acts of congress. Among them are the free alcohol law, pure food law and anti-pass section interstate commerce law, and modification of the navigation laws to simplify enrollments and licenses.

GOVERNOR HUGHES OF NEW YORK

Albany, Jan. 1.—Charles E. Hughes was inaugurated governor of New York in the presence of a large assemblage from all sections of the state today. The inauguration was preceded by a parade of the various companies and commands of the third brigade, National Guard, of New York.

REPUBLICANS IN COMPLETE CONTROL

Harrisburg, Penn., Jan. 1.—The general assembly of the state of Pennsylvania convened at noon today. After organization and reading of Governor Pennypacker's last message a recess was taken until January 14. The Republicans have a majority in both houses. In his message Governor Pennypacker courted investigation of the charges of graft in connection with the \$13,500,000 state capitol building, recently completed.

Higgins Goes In.
Providence, R. I., Jan. 1.—James H. Higgins was inaugurated governor today with the usual ceremonies.

COAL MINERS OF COLORADO GET MORE WAGES

Denver, January 1.—The wages of the coal miners of Southern Colorado have been advanced ten percent. Six thousand are benefitted and the increase aggregates \$600,000 a year.

RECEPTION AT WHITE HOUSE TODAY WELL ATTENDED

Washington, Jan. 1.—Each year the White House doors swing open to all the nation on January 1, and a heartier welcome was never extended to visitors than greeted the thousands who called to pay their respects to the chief executive. New Year's cheer banished all rank and class distinction, and the president met ambassadors and laborers with the same firm handshake. While the marine band played patriotic airs the great throng moved slowly through the executive mansion and in the greeting of the president men and women of all ages and conditions

found renewed devotion to the republic and its democratic ideals. The diplomatic corps, judiciary, army, navy and civil officials of the various departments were received in turn before the thousands of citizens, who had been standing in line for hours, to meet the president. President and Mrs. Roosevelt, the vice president and members of the cabinet and their wives exchanged New Year's greetings in the library, and later the entire party descended to the blue room, where the president and Mrs. Roosevelt and members of the cabinet and their wives received the visitors.

GANS-HERMAN BATTLE TODAY AT GOLDFIELD

Big Crowd Braves Zero Weather to See Championship Bout - Gans Was Four to One Favorite in Betting at Opening of Fight Both in Prime Condition

Tonopah, Nev., Jan. 1.—New Year's day was ushered in with zero weather. The blizzard of yesterday has subsided, but a raw wind is blowing. Everything was in readiness for this afternoon's boxing contest between Gans and Hermann. There is a brisk sale of seats today and throngs of miners from the surrounding mining camps are in town to witness the contest.

Both fighters express the greatest confidence in the outcome, while the odds are three to one on Gans to win and the mutuals show a majority of bets on Gans to win in from eleven to fifteen rounds. The impression prevails that the odds will change somewhat in Herman's favor before the fighters enter the ring, which accounts for so little money being in sight.

Gans weighed 139 1/2 pounds in full street costume, including shoes, rubbers and a heavy sweater. Herman is also within the weight, which is 133 pounds in fighting costume.

Gans proved himself easily the master of the kid, outpointing him at every stage of the game until the eighth round, when the negro put the Chicago boy out with a series of punches on the head and jaw. Herman did not have a look in. He landed some hard blows on Gans' body and made his best stand in the fifth round, but the terrific punches, science and generalship of the veteran were too much for him.

NATIONAL PURE FOOD LAW IS IN EFFECT

The national pure food and drug law, passed at the late session of congress, went into effect today.

Manufacturers, retailers and jobbers of all kinds of foods, drugs and liquors, whose business is affected by the new law in Oregon, as well as all over the United States, are worried.

The act covers the entire food, drug and liquor product concerned in interstate commerce. As nearly all concerns in the food, drug and liquor business in Oregon do an interstate business, they are all more or less affected.

Those provisions of the law requiring the label to state the ingredients of the various articles affected, and requiring that all such goods shall be labeled, makes the matter interesting for the manufacturers and dealers.

The law provides that all goods affected, sold through interstate commerce after the first of the year, shall be labeled in accordance with the act. Those already manufactured and ready for sale must be labeled with supplementary stickers to show the character of the goods, where made, and of what composed.

Has Two Aims.

The law seeks to accomplish two things: First, to prevent adulteration, and second, to prevent misrepresentation in any particular. Under its provisions any article of food, drug or liquor which is in any way of mannered to mislead or deceive, or lower its quality, is prohibited and confiscated.
