COTTAGE GROVE NEWS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Freight cars are coming forward more liberally than was the fact in November, but there are not yet enough to do the business. Two trains per day could be loaded by the mills tributary to this station, and that without increasing the capacity of the mills. Full mill crews are not now employed, though if the cars come, increased activity at the mills and in the logging camps will result. The embargo on lumber destined for San Francisco has been removed.

Seven cars of supplies for the Black Butte quicksilver mine have come into the Cottage Grove station within the past few days. Much of this freight is glazed terracotta pipe to be used in the retort of the reducing furnace. It all goes by wagon from here to Black Butte. Think of those dirt roads a month hence.

The Postal Telegraph office has moved this week from where it has done business for several years to the new location on Main street between Third and Fourth streets, recently vacated by the telephone exchange. The Postal Telegraph office is larger quarters and is better housed in every way.

The Rouse and Strtridge mills have been selling lumber quite liberally of late. It is stated that 30 carloads are to come down the river road to the S. P. Co.'s siding at Latham as fast as teams can bring it. Traffic will soon demand a rock road if it does not already.

The land in the Lorano district on which the most promising coal prospects were found has been sold to a timber company. Further prospecting is probably indefinitely postponed.

The Brown Lumber Company has completed the dredging of the mill pond and the donkey engine used for the work has been returned to the woods.

The seven-year-old son of George Knowlty, living on the West Side near the flouring mills, died suddenly last night of membranous croup.—Western Oregon.
