

TOM SMITH WILL ENTER THE UNIVERSITY

Tom Smith, the crack athlete of the Lowell High School, of San Francisco, and the champion half-mile runner of the Coast, will enter the University of Oregon at the beginning of the Fall Term, next September, says the Portland Telegram. He will graduate from the High School at the end of this semester, but instead of going directly to college, will take a two months trip to the City of Mexico, where his father is a mining engineer. In a personal letter to a friend in Portland he says:

"When the fall season opens, I expect to be on hand to register at Oregon. There has been some talk about my entering Princeton University, but there is nothing in it, although several Princeton men have approached me on the subject. I will enter Oregon, unless something unforeseen happens. On my return from Mexico, I will go to Virginia to take part in the A. A. U. games there under the colors of the Olympic club."

In Tom Smith the University will get one of the most promising athletes in the country. Generally speaking, High School athletes have not made good in all that is expected of them when they enter college.

bet Smith is different from most crack High School men.

He has not spent four years in arduous competition during the growing portion of his youth. Up to two years ago he had not accomplished anything of note, but under the training of George Middleton he came out rapidly, and last year covered 50 yards in 5.5 seconds. That is within 2-5 of a second of the world's amateur record. It is not too much to expect that with a couple of years' training at the university he may tie or break that record. He also ran the half mile in 2:04 3-5.

Such a man, just coming into his majority, has wonderful possibilities, and Trainer "Bill" Hayward will work night and day to develop him. Hayward is probably the lodestar attracting Smith northward, though there are other influences. His old trainer, Middleton, was a pupil of Hayward, and this fact and the coming out of Kelly under Hayward's tutelage, have probably combined in drawing Smith here.

Oregon's supporters will regret that he does not come up for the spring semester, for he would be a welcome addition to the track team now at the University. With Kelly, Moores, Hug and McKinney, reinforced by Smith, Oregon would have a crack man in every department of field sports.

THE THEATRE FORGOTTEN

How the Realities of a Popular Rural Play Stimulate Imagination.

To those who have followed the career of the great rural play, "Quincy Adams Sawyer," to the extent of witnessing a large number of its performances, the most notable feature of the drama is the power which certain of its scenes exert upon the audience in compelling illusion. Especially is this true of the famous husking bee scene, in which the color and humor of the rural festivity are so vividly presented as to make this portion of the performance an example of the art which conceals art and hence is perfect.

The players in the merry scene are so thoroughly in sympathy with it, their pranks and laughter are spontaneous, the little details supplied in the stage settings are so perfect that as the scene advances the audience gradually enters into the spirit of the situation and forgets the theatre. The heated atmosphere of the playhouse is dissipated and from the natural simplicity and life like charm of the merriest there sweeps over the spectator that perfect illusion which comes but seldom from stage art. The footlights disappear and the actors on one side and the lookers-on upon the other, seem to mingle in wholesome enjoyment.
