OREGON SECURITIES CONCERN IS BANKRUPT

At last the Oregon Securities Co., of which it is said that Portland people own more than 200,000 shares, has gone bankrupt, and a receiver for the defunct Southern Oregon Mining Company was appointed by Judge C. E. Wolverton yesterday morning in the United States circuit court on application of the Trust Company of America, says the Portland Journal.

A. B. Wood, manager of the bankrupt company, was named by Judge Wolverton as receiver, and from now on until a reorganization of the company takes place will handle the affairs of the company.

After years of trials and tribulations, in which many hundreds of thousands of dollars have been sunk another stage in the great mining property, which is said to be very valuable, has come to pass, and other investors with equal amounts of money and the same golden fleece dangling before their vision will be asked to step in and relieve the present financial difficulties of the company.

Cash Has Disappeared.
Oregon Securities stock, that sold at one time as high as \$1 a share, the par value, was quoted day before yesterday at 1 1/2 cents. A gold bond issue, on which the company realized \$300,000 in cash last year, and the remainder of the issue, which is held as collateral, has disappeared, and the officials say the improvements on the mining property are worth \$300,000 solely as improvements to the mining property.

The earnings of the company, amounting to about \$90,000, have gone the way that all money goes in large concerns, and yet the scheme for reorganization is so subtle that every owner of stock in the Oregon Securities Company will receive an equal value in the new company—that is, providing one is organized.

There are about five men who own the majority of the stock held in Portland. Four of these men are C. H. Thompson, A. W. Goddard, E. C. Goddard and Frederick Eggert. Mr. Eggert is a director of the company and is said to own 80,000 shares of the defunct company. When seen he said that he knew nothing about the plan to place the company in the hands of a receiver, and had no idea what plans would be made for the future.

Many Small Investors.
In addition to these men there are hundreds of other people in Portland who own all the way from 100 to 2000 shares. All of this stock sold at amounts from 20 to 30 cents a share, generally around 26 1/2 cents, although much of the stock that is now worth about 1 cent was sold as high as 50 cents. G. B. Hengen, secretary and treasurer of the company, who arrived from New York Tuesday, said yesterday that the stock was quoted on the Boston curb as high as from 5 to 6 cents.

The Trust Company of America, which applied for the receiver, is the trustee for the bonds issued last year, secured by a mortgage or deed of trust on the property. In the bill of complaint the trust company alleges that the defunct mining company has been unable to pay the interest on the bonds and that application for a receiver was made because of that fact. The company was represented by J. V. Beach, of Portland, and Ames R. Burnett, of New York. Senator Joseph Simon appeared for the Oregon Securities Company and agreed to the appointment of Mr. Wood as receiver.

CAUSE OF FAILURE.
Inefficient Management Believed to Have Killed Concern.

The properties of the Oregon Securities Company, consisting of about 50 claims, or 1000 acres, located in the Bohemia district, are said to be rich in gold, but inefficient management is given as the cause of failure to make them profitable. The Oregon Securities Company was organized in 1902, and is a consolidation of five mines—Helena No. 1, Helena No. 2, Musick, Champion and Broadway. Some of these mines were profitably worked before the consolidation. Helena No. 1 paid 21 monthly dividends of one-half cent per share. After the consolidation the Oregon Securities Company paid two dividends, the first being one cent per share, and the last, in June, 1903, of one-half cent per share. Since that time large development schemes have consumed the revenues without a corresponding increase of output.

A Miner's Boast.
One of the miners who has occupied a position of responsibility is quoted as saying that he could, if

allowed his own way, take out \$100,000 a month in gold.

The Oregon Securities Company was largely financed in Portland. About 1,000,000 shares are held in this city and the shareholders paid from 40 to 75 cents per share for most of their holdings. The stock never was sold lower than 25 cents per share, even when first placed on the market. The mines were in 1902 controlled by P. J. and R. J. Jennings, of Portland, and after the consolidation, engineered by C. B. Hengen, the new company took over the combined properties.

Stockholders to Meet.
This company was first incorporated in New Jersey and later passed under the same name to an Oregon corporation. The capital stock was placed at \$5,000,000, each share worth \$1 par value. There were about 4,500,000 shares of stock sold, and this will pass into the new company if one is formed, of which there is no doubt, because a meeting of the stockholders in Portland will be held tomorrow, probably at the Portland Hotel, for the purpose of discussing a scheme for reorganization.

It is said that a meeting of the directors was held in the New York office some time ago, but no definite arrangement for the company's future could be made. Mr. Hengen said this morning that he hoped that by consulting the large Portland stockholders an agreement could be reached that would result in a new company being formed with a smaller capitalization. The idea is to arrange so that each owner of stock in the Oregon Securities Company would be able to realize an equal value in the new company, although the value of a share in the new company would be greater than a share in the old.
