

FRIENDLY'S BASKET BALL TEAM WINNING LAURELS

Friendly's basketball team returned yesterday afternoon from a very successful trip through Southern Oregon, having played four games, winning three of them. At Roseburg Tuesday night they played their first game with the husky high school lads of that town and were defeated decisively by the score of 25 to 11. Instead of being discouraged over the outcome of this game the boys determined to play all the harder in the coming games. At Medford the next night the team won an easy victory from the high school, the score being 29 to 13. The next day was a day for rest, for on Friday and Saturday nights the hardest games of the trip were expected, those with the strong Ashland Athletic Club. In the first three minutes of play on Friday night the score stood 8 to 0 in Ashland's favor, and in the middle of the half it was 14 to 1 in favor of Ashland. Right here is where the Eugene team showed its fighting spirit and at the end of the half the score was Ashland, 16; Friendly's, 14. In the next half Friendly's team made 20 points to Ashland's 10, thus winning the game by the score of 34 to 24. The result of this game was a surprise to all Ashland, and on Saturday night there was a record-breaking crowd in attendance because the Corvallis team was the only one that had ever before defeated Ashland on its own floor. However, the crowd was impartial, and yelled just as much for Friendly's team as for the home boys, which, however, were outplayed in the fastest game ever played in Ashland, the score being 19 to 14. At all the towns the boys were royally entertained, and when our southern neighbors play return games here we will try and show them as nice a time. The next big game Friendly's team will take part in will probably be played in the arena on Thursday night, the 10th, with the strong Roseburg team.

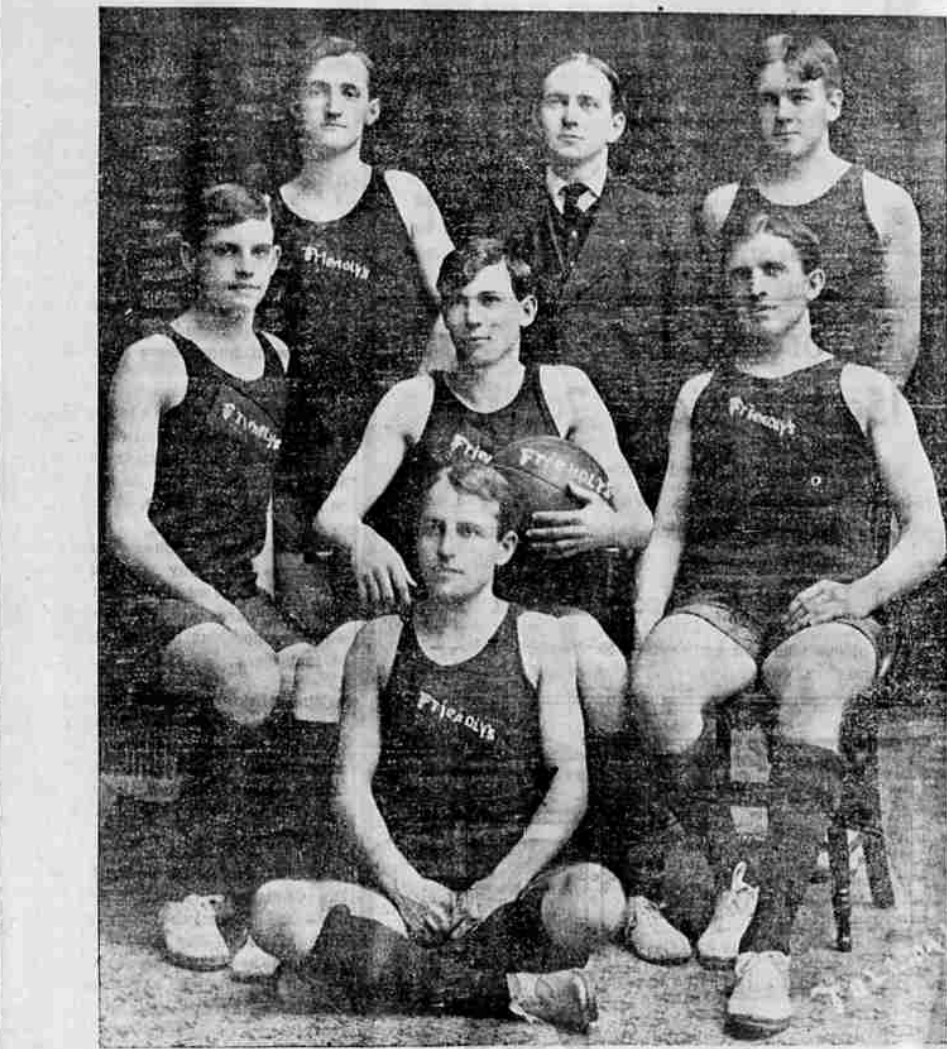
