

LOGS PILED UP ON BEACH NORTH OF SIUSLAW

Loss Estimated as High as \$12,000.

Towns of Mapleton and Acme
Flooded on Thursday of Last
Week - 16,000,000 Feet of
Logs Passed Mapleton

(Special Correspondence.)
Florence, Jan. 6.—The sheer boom
of the Siuslaw Lumber Company
broke Thursday evening, letting be-
tween 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 feet
of logs go to sea. These logs were
valued at between \$7000 and \$12,-
000. They are now piled up on the
ocean beach on the north side of the
Siuslaw river, scattered up the coast
for 5 miles. It will be impossible
to get them into the river. The
heaviest loss will be the Oregon &
California Lumber Company and the
Siuslaw Lumber Company.

The Flood at Mapleton.
Mapleton, Jan. 6.—The heavy rain
last Wednesday and Thursday raised
the river the highest it has been this
season. Thursday morning by eight
o'clock the river was full of logs and
continued so until dark, and some
were still running Friday morning.
It is thought that nearly 16,000,000
feet passed Mapleton Thursday.
About 1500 logs were lost at the Acme
boom by the failure of the sheer
boom to work properly. This will be
a heavy loss to the boom company or
the mills.
The high water flooded Acme and
Mapleton, boats were in demand and
from twelve at night until noon Fri-
day that was the only mode of travel-
ling in Mapleton, as the streets were
flooded so deep that sidewalks were
either under water or washed away.
There was but little loss aside from
the washing away of walks and fences.
We hear of some ranchers who
have lost some stock by drowning,
but so heavy loss of this kind has
been reported.

There are a thousand cases of
typhoid fever reported in Scranton,
Pa., owing to a contaminated water
supply.
The Supreme Court of Washing-
ton has decided that Esther Mitchell
the holy roller fanatic who murder-
ed her brother at Seattle, cannot be
legally deported to Oregon. It was
also decided to appoint a lunacy com-
mission to enquire into the mental
condition of the woman.
Senator J. W. Bailey, accused of
being mixed up with Standard Oil,
was defeated in the second primaries

of Travis county, in which the city of
Austin is located, on Saturday last.
This is the strongest Democratic
county in the state and Bailey's de-
feat there may result in his failure
of re-election by the legislature.

Francis J. Henry, after securing
141 indictments for land frauds in
Oregon with about 50 convictions has
tendered his resignation as assist-
ant United States attorney general
and will devote his time exclusively
to cleaning up the corruption of the
municipal government at San Fran-
cisco.
