SPRING TRACK TRAINING TO BEGIN SOON

Trainer "Bill" Hayward of the University, states that he will begin spring work with the distance men of the track team as soon as the men are settled down in their college work. The sprinters, jumpers and hurdlers will also be out soon afterward. Hayward, during the holidays has had the covered track worked over so that it will be in better shape for the coming season. The trainer expects to have at least thirty-five men out for work. Possibly more will come since, in all likelihood, a team will go to the Jamestown fair from the Northwest, and a meet will be held with California.
The latest plan for a meet with one of the California institutions is to have either California or Stanford, the one which wins in the dual meet, go to Seattle, where a triple meet will be held for the championship of the Pacific Coast. The reason for the three colleges meeting at Seattle would be that expenses could be much more easily met there. Oregon is not likely to go to California, owing to the fact that the season there is so much earlier than farther north, and her team would hardly be in condition. A late date cannot be obtained in the South.

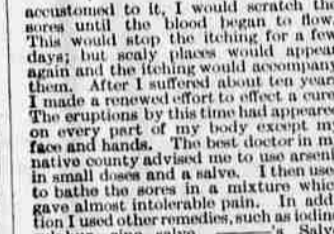
Phone Habit Breaks Up Home.
