Mrs. C. C. Hammond, who has been very ill for some time, was taken to Portland last night to be placed in a hospital for treatment.

J. P. Hilliard, the man who said he had rather serve his \$25 fine in jail than pay the fine, related last night and dug up the mazzuma.

The board of fire delegates met last night and elected officers for the ensuing year as follows: W. W. Stevens, president; W. G. Martin, vice president; A. C. Mathews, secretary; W. L. Coppertoll, treasurer.

The remains of the six-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. C. seller, formerly of Coburg, who died in Portland yesterday, arrived in Eugene this afternoon and were placed in a casket for burial.

The thermometer at seven o'clock this morning registered 23 degrees above zero, which is the coldest yet this winter. The ground was frozen hard and in some places where the sun has not struck it, remained that way all day.

The basketball team needs his services as coach, but will do the best they can until he is able to be here.

The "Quincy Adams Sawyer" company arrived today from the north in charge of Manager Stewart, and will play to a crowded house tonight, judging from the advance seat sale. From Eugene they will go direct to Stockton, Cal., without stopping. Everywhere the theatrical critics speak highly of the company.

They have been due for a long time, but on account of the delay in freight trains they are not expected for several days yet.

She was in her usual health until a few minutes before her death, and was talking with her husband for a few minutes before he arose this morning. He got up and went out to the barn to do the chores and a boy came running to the barn and told him that Mrs. Christener was very sick. When he reached the house he found her in a dying condition and she expired a few minutes later. Dr. DeBar was telephoned for, before the end came, but his arrival was too late. He pronounced the cause of death as heart disease.

Mrs. Christener was 47 years old and had lived in Lane county for the past 22 years. Besides her husband she leaves her mother in Oakland, Cal., and four children, as follows: Pearl Schlomberg, from a previous marriage; Willie, Walter and Leone Christener, the latter being only three months old.

The funeral will be held on Friday of this week with interment in Oak Hill cemetery.
