PRESIDENT CAMPBELL SPEAKS OF THE SOUTH

The assembly of the university was addressed this morning by President Campbell, on his trip south, with stereopticon illustrations of various places by which he passed. There were between two and three hundred people present who enjoyed the address immensely. While a great part of the time was taken up by descrip- tions of the places passed through President Campbell brought out some interesting side lights on the South- ern people.

He said that they face exactly the same problems that we do in many respects, for there the railways fail to furnish cars for the shippers the same as they do here. In regard to the negro problem, he said, the Southern people do not consider the question so seriously as we do here in the north. They seem to think that the negroes will slowly be ob- literated by a steadily increasing death rate and decreasing birth rate. Then, too, the white immigration is being pointed south, and that will help the situation in many commu- nities.

President Campbell also intimated that he believed that the "hard times" fears of so many people were not based on very good grounds. Na- ture Earth has boundless possibili- ties, and as our intelligence in- creases we become better prepared to take advantage of these possi- bilities, and so will steadily find our- selves in a better position for im- provement and wealth, was the trend of the speaker's thought.

Plant is Now On a Paying Basis and Doing a Good Business—New Building to Be Erected.

A meeting of the stockholders of the Eugene Woollen Mill Co. was held yesterday afternoon, Hon. T. B. Kay, of Salem, the heaviest stock- holder, being present. The present officers of the company were re-elec- ted and reports of the business of the past year heard. The plant is now on a paying basis, the output at present being \$9000 a month, with a payroll of over \$2000 a month. A new wool house will be built in the spring and a complete sprinkling sys- tem will be installed. E. Koppe will continue as superintendent of the mill and Arthur Ford, an expert, has been installed as head buyer and grader.
