The University School of Music will present a strong musical attraction at the Eugene theatre next Monday night in the person of Leonora Jackson, the distinguished violinist. In addition to Mrs. Jackson the other members of the company are especially capable in their particular accomplishments.

Miss Florence Marion Pace is one of Chicago's most gifted singers, a lovely, radiant, self-possessed woman. She has a beautiful voice with splendid tone shading and her style is dramatic. Her tones are pure, sweet and brilliant. The spirit and fervor with which she sings captivates every audience and brings her return dates.

Charles Edward Clark received his early musical education at the Toronto Conservatory of Music, where he studied for six years with the best teachers in that institution. After two years of touring in the United States Mr. Clark went abroad and studied with William Shakespeare in London and Mr. Bouhy in Paris, and we now present him as an accomplished and finished artist.

It will be seen here at the Eugene theatre Wednesday evening, January 16, with an entirely new scenic equipment, and with the cleverest "Yon" in the east since the days of Gus Heege, who wrote and created the part. George Thompson, the young Swedish actor, whom Kennedy and Willard have secured for the role of the awkward Swedish boy who becomes tangled up in the English language at critical times, is a young singing and dancing comedian who hails from Stockholm and no unknown quantity in the world of the theatre on the continent. Mr. Thompson is gifted with a really cultivated, beautiful tenor voice, and sought operatic laurels until a financial consideration of suitable proportions induced him to consider a five-year contract with Managers Kennedy and Willard.

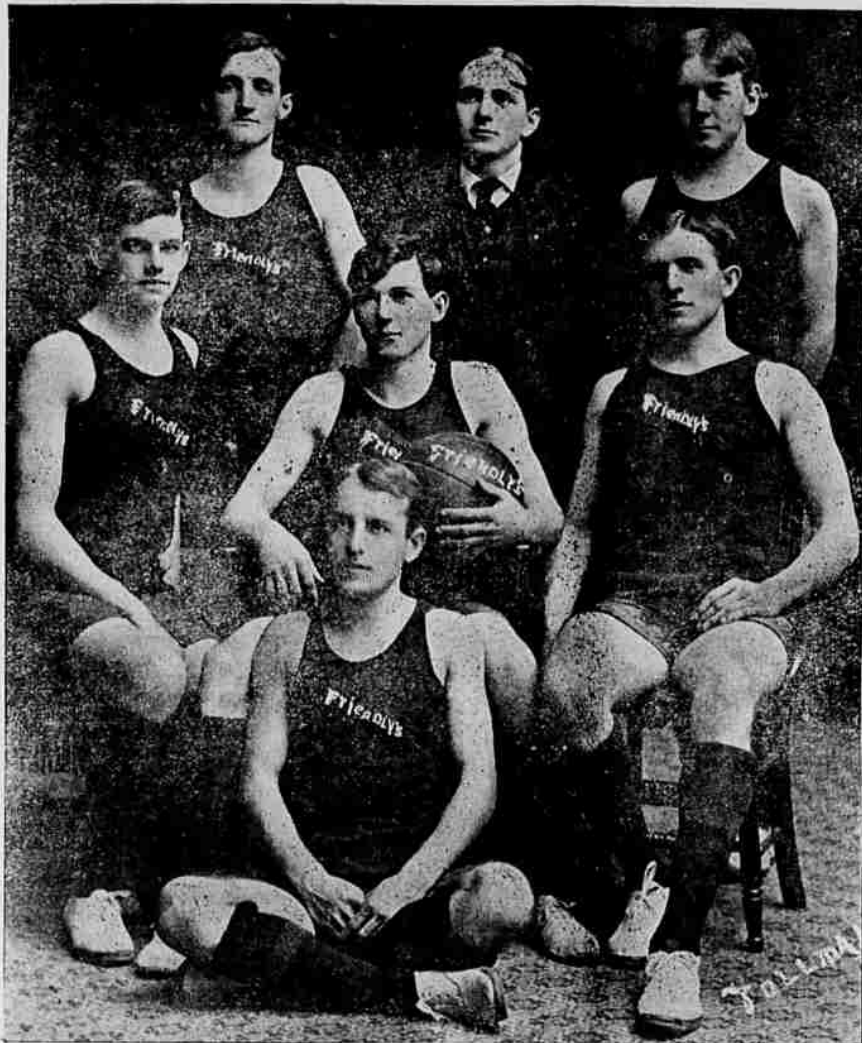
