The Roseburg boys took their defeat like all gentlemen would, and had no kick against their opponents. They, however, desire another game either at Eugene or Roseburg, each team having won one contest.

BIG FORCE OF MEN AT WORK IN HENDRICKS' PARK

Mayor Wilkins and Street Committee of the City Council Inspect Work Being Done - Picturesque Boulevard Being Constructed to Top of Hill

Mayor Wilkins and the street committee of the city council, consisting of L. O. Beckwith, T. H. Garrett and A. W. Gilbert, drove out to Hendricks' Park yesterday afternoon and inspected the work that is being done on the grounds under the direction of the street committee. They found a force of 12 men very busy grubbing out the boulevard which is to extend from the end of the street at the Svarvud residence through the park and to the top of the hill. It will wind in and out among the small hills and around the draws and will be one of the most picturesque driveways in the state.

George Rein, who has charge of the work, has had a number of years of experience in Yellowstone Park, and the work is being done in a systematic and competent manner.

Moon & Tingley, who have the contract to fence the park, will begin the work in a few days. W. S. Moon, a member of the firm now being in Portland ordering the fencing.

The mayor and the councilmen were very well satisfied with the progress of the work being done in the park.
