FINED \$40 FOR BEING DRUNK AND DISORDERLY

William Fay, a butcher, of Coburg, was fined \$40 by Police Judge Dorris this morning for being drunk and disorderly. This is the heaviest fine imposed in the Eugene municipal court for such an offense in many years.

Fay came to town yesterday and proceeded to fill up on "soft drinks." When he went to Barnard & West's stable last night about 12 o'clock to get his horse and go home he became very abusive to the stablemen and created a big disturbance. He was placed under arrest by Officers Croner and Purdy and taken to the city jail where he deposited \$40 with the officers to insure his appearance in court whereupon he was released and allowed to go home. L. L. Walker appeared for him this morning and entered a plea of guilty and the judge placed the fine at \$40, remarking that it would have been \$50 had the deposit been that much.

He sent word to Fay that if he is found in town again he will be arrested upon the charge of resisting an officer.

The electric pumps at the water works which were out of order for a day or two, rendering the pressure in the mains very low, have been repaired and this morning began pumping water into the big reservoir.

Three more right-of-way deeds to the Oregon Eastern Railway, the S. P. company's Natron extension were filed for record in the county clerk's office yesterday. They were for land on the farms of J. B. Hills, Henrietta Hills Jacoby and Mrs. Kate Wallace.

George Harper yesterday instituted divorce proceedings against his wife, Minnie Harper, on the ground of desertion. In his complaint, filed by his attorneys, Dorris & Skipworth, he alleges that they were married in Lane county on October 12, 1904, and that on or about December 1, 1905, his wife, without cause or provocation, willfully deserted him and has since refused to live with him.

John Carpenter, employed on the construction work at the Southern Pacific Company's mill No. 3 on the Hawk, is at the Eugene hospital suffering with a badly lacerated head

as the result of a fall he received Wednesday. He was working on the frame at the mill when he slipped and fell headfirst on the floor, 20 feet below, and rolled off the floor on a log. He was unconscious for a time and it was thought at first that the injuries were serious, but they proved to be only scalp wounds.
