NEW PRESS READY TO RUN.
 Next Monday's Guard will be printed on our new press, a two-revolution Crabbler. We think that this new machine will answer all requirements and will complete our plant so that we will have facilities second to none in any similar field. During the past week the work of tearing out the old press and installing the new one has seriously inconvenienced the whole office, and we have issued the Daily Guard under great difficulties.
 We now sincerely hope to be able to go ahead with the steady improvements of the Guard contemplated when we began the installation of the present plant, involving the outlay of a large amount of money.

SWIFT, SAFE ADVERTISING.
 Daily advertising gives no chance for accidents to happen. This is an idea advanced by a recent writer who supports his belief as follows:
 "An important reason why newspaper advertising is the best of all is because it produces the quickest results. The people have been educated by the newspapers to prompt action in responding to advertisements. A very large proportion of the advertising in the daily papers, notably the retail stores and classified advertising, must be responded to promptly on account of its nature.
 The greater the period between the beginning of a campaign and the decision when the results are figured up, the greater opportunity for something to go wrong—for the factory to burn to the ground; for the bank to fail; for a strike or a boycott to raise its sinister head; for the cost of new material to go sky-rocketing.
 The daily newspaper reduces this great risk to a minimum, because instead of requiring your copy six or more weeks in advance of going to press, six hours, or it may be six minutes only, are necessary.

TEARING OUT
TURNTABLE
 Eugene's Hopes of Becoming a Terminal or Division Point Seem to Have Been Blasted - Turntable Being Taken to Crabtree, on Woodburn-Natron Branch
 Whatever hopes Eugene has ever entertained of being a terminal or division point for the Southern Pacific Railway Company have gone a glimmering for the company is now tearing down the turntable which it built here in May, 1905, the only evidence that they ever intended to do anything for Eugene in the way of establishing terminal yards here, notwithstanding numerous and varied reports to the contrary during the past several years.
 The turntable will be taken to Crabtree, a small station on the Woodburn-Natron branch, and erected there. On account of the Santiam bridge near that point being washed out during the recent freshet, the trains on that branch from the north are compelled to stop and turn around there, and the turntable will be used to facilitate the movement of trains, as it will be a long time before the bridge is rebuilt, if ever. There has been talk of building a cutoff to avoid crossing the river at that point as the bridge, on account of the ever-changing channel of the river, has always been a dangerous one. The Springfield passenger train makes the trip to and from Woodburn by the way of Albany.
 Springfield a Division.
 Every indication points to the fact that the company intends to make Springfield a division point for the line that is to be built to Klamath county and across the state via the Lake Odell Pass, the route for which is now being surveyed. They have erected big oil tanks there and have recently purchased several acres of land in addition to the large tract they already had. The grounds are now entirely large enough for the necessary terminal buildings, tracks and shops, and it would be no surprise to the Guard to see the work of putting them in begin in the near future.
