THE GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

A VISIT of some weeks' duration to the United States, wherein I had the opportunity of inspecting the great American manufacturing and of examining in detail the progress of American industry, convinces me that the British public has no idea of the kind of prosperity the United States is enjoying today. It is no exaggeration to state that AT NO PREVIOUS PERIOD IN HUMAN HISTORY has such prosperity been known in any country.

Every one in America is making money; not only making money, but making it IN PILES—in such piles that the ordinary standards of comfort and luxury are disappearing and are being replaced by new ideals. The demand for labor is such that it cannot be supplied, whereby work in many places is very much curtailed.

THE PURCHASING POWER OF THE PEOPLE IS RUSHING UP BY LEAPS AND BOUNDS.

AUTUMNAL VESPERS

By Bayard Taylor



BAYARD TAYLOR, poet, traveler, editor and diplomat, was born in Pennsylvania Jan. 11, 1825, and died in Berlin on Dec. 19, 1897. Of Bayard Taylor's active life it is impossible to give an adequate idea in a brief sketch. His first poems were published when he was sixteen. He traveled about over Europe in 1844-45 and in 1846 was sailing gold in California. His life was a series of long travels and trips abroad; letters and other contributions to the press and innumerable lecture tours. At the time of his death he was United States minister to Germany.

THE clarion wind that blew so loud at morn,
 Whirling a thousand leaves from every bough
 Of the purple woods; has not a whisper now;
 Hushed on the uplands is the huntsman's horn,
 And hushes whistling around the tented corn;
 The angry warm cricket lets his clock run down,
