ORDINANCES PASSED BY CITY COUNCIL

Reform Measure, Intended to Stop Sale of Liquor at "Soft Drink" Places, Made a Law by City Fathers Last Night - Excludes Cigar Stores and Restaurants

The reform ordinance, as mentioned in last evening's Guard, was passed by the city council last night, and it is substantially as outlined by this paper except that cigar stores and restaurants are allowed to remain open on Sunday. The ordinance was especially aimed at the "soft drink" places and is intended to do away with the selling of liquor. The ordinance as amended and passed gives the sheriff of Lane County the right of a police officer of the city and the officers the right to search any place for liquor.

The vote was as follows:
 Ayes—Calkins, Garrett, Bristow, McCrady, Gilbert, Noes—Beckwith, Bristow, Spencer.

The ordinance prohibiting roaming the streets after midnight, recently introduced, was passed with the following vote:
 Ayes—Calkins, Garrett, Bristow, McCrady, Gilbert, Noes—Beckwith, Henderson, Spencer.

An ordinance amending an ordinance passed in 1889, in reference to disorderly conduct, was passed unanimously.

Routine Business.

The street committee reported the use of 16,275 feet of lumber during the month. They asked that improvements on Summit avenue be deferred. Recommended the building of a new bridge at Seventeenth and Willamette streets. They reported progress on placing names of street in Fairmount and the grubbing out of boulevards at the park. The sum of \$135 has all been expended for labor on park and the rules were suspended and warrants ordered paid on the same.

The fire and water committee reported both reservoirs full of water and in the matter of explosives, gasoline, etc., asked for a more rigid enforcement of the present ordinance with reference to the amount carried in stock in town. The committee recommended that the are light at East Ninth and Patterson streets be moved so that it will throw its light down the centre of the latter street. Also that a person be hired at the salary of \$15 per month to relieve Fireman Chas. Croner at stated times for meals, etc.

The health committee reported that the sewer extending from the Jefferson street sewer to the south part of town was inexpedient at this time for lack of water.

A petition with 171 names asking that farmers and producers of meat have the same privilege of peddling in the city of Eugene that those who bring hay and wood have was presented and referred to the health committee.

An ordinance providing for the levying of an assessment on the abutting property on High street, from East Third to First, was passed.

COOPER STIRS UP THE PEOPLE OF ST. LOUIS

St. Louis, Jan. 14.—This city is at present in the midst of an excitement beyond anything that it has experienced in recent years.

Old and young, rich and poor, all seem to have become beside themselves over an individual who was a stranger to St. Louis until two years ago.
