HOP MARKET SHOWS DECIDED IMPROVEMENT

The hop market shows a decided improvement, with prospects for higher prices. Geo. T. Hall & Son, of this city, have sold 30 bales of medium to James Hayes, representing E. Clemens Horst & Co., of San Francisco, and the same parties have made an offer to the Dunn estate of 12½ cents for their lot of hops. These prices are much better than either lot has ever before been worth in the market before, and shows a decided improvement in the tone of the market.

The New York market is very strong at from 20 cents for "any old thing" to as high as 23 cents being offered for strictly choice grades. In comparison with New York prices Oregon hops should be selling at from 8 to 10 cents a pound higher than quotations, but the buyers' trust seems to have matters in their own hands.

In New York, as well as on the continent, practically all the hops are out of the growers' hands, and it is predicted this will raise the price of Oregon hops soon, as buyers must come to the coast for their supplies.

From New York Papers: The Wall Street Journal of January 8 says: "The firm feeling for the last few weeks still continues, and almost any kind of hops command from 18 to 20 cents, while for the best as high as 23 cents has been offered. This does not mean that there are many of any kind left for the amount still in the growers' hands is reduced to a small compass."

The New York Journal and Bulletin of Jan. 8 says: "Later advices from up-state reported an active demand, with few hops left and buyers said to be bidding up to 21½¢ for choice Oneida county goods. The continued activity in New York state continues to be a factor of considerable importance and with active buying in nearly all hop growing sections, the crop is passing rapidly out of growers' hands. The prices paid have ranged from 18 to 21½¢, with more money said to have been offered in some instances for choice grades, but without business resulting. English and German markets are reported firm."

The Cooperstown Farmer of January 4th says: The 1906 crop of Otsego county is getting pretty well cleaned up. Perhaps 200 bales were bought in the Cooperstown market during the past week. Martin Moakler reports the purchase of several bales at 21c."

Produces 30c Hops

The Schenar Standard of January 5th says: "During the harvesting of the hop crop a few growers and others interested insisted that the hop market would reach 30 cents before the crop had passed out of the growers' hands. It is said that there are not more than 6000 bales left with the growers, and the middlemen want them so badly that they will pay well to get them before the fight begins between themselves. It looks very much as though the 30-cent price would soon be reached."

JASPER NEWS
