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FAIRMOUNT STILL AFTER FREE MAIL DELIVERY

East Eugene Improvement Club Prepares Petition and Will Present It to the Proper Authorities—Question of Making Fairmount Separate Ward

Another enthusiastic meeting of the East Eugene Improvement Club was held in Fairmount hall last night and various topics of interest discussed, chief among them being that of free mail delivery in the eastern part of the city. Addresses, showing that the necessary improvements for the service have been made and the other conditions required by the postoffice department have been met, were delivered, and as the outcome of the meeting a petition was prepared to be presented to the proper authorities asking that the service be extended.

The fact was brought out that of the 150 houses in that suburb at least 100 of them are reached by sidewalks and the owners of the other 50 are willing to erect boxes at the nearest corner touched by the sidewalk, so the carrier could make his rounds entirely on the walks. A map showing the location of sidewalks and of the houses to be served by free delivery has been drawn up and will be sent along with the petition.

Another matter discussed was that of why the school directors of the Eugene district should not be elected by wards, the same as the city councilmen, and why should Fairmount not be made a separate ward. Another question that was to have come up for discussion but was postponed till another meeting is "What Has Fairmount Gained by Being Annexed to Eugene?"

LEGISLATURE GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS

Salem, Or., Jan. 16.—Among the bills introduced yesterday were the following:

Railway commission and reciprocal demurrage bills, introduced by Chapin, of Multnomah, and Jones, of Polk and Lincoln.

The most important resolution was one enabling the legislature to pass a law exempting \$300 of family household goods. The old law was held unconstitutional by the supreme court. The resolution, when adopted, gives the legislature the power to pass the exemption clause.

Proceedings Yesterday.
Two resolutions for supplies were introduced, as were resolutions asking for the appointment of a committee on resolutions.

Herman Rothschild asked the appointment of a printer's page to carry bills from one house to another, to ensure safe delivery. A committee on clerk appointments made the following appointments:

Wilson; state engineer, John F. Lewis.

Nine senate bills of the last session vetoed by the governor were returned and laid on the table.

Democrats Drove Hard Bargain.
According to John W. Kelly, the Telegram's special correspondent at Salem, the Democrats got the best of the bargain, by throwing their votes against Hodson and in favor of Haines for president of the senate. He says:

Exactly two minutes before the senate was called to order Monday afternoon the deal was completed between the Haines forces and four of the six Democratic senators whereby the latter would support the senator from Washington in return for concessions valuable to themselves as members of the legislature, and to the Democratic party of Oregon. When the gavel fell the Hodson men were aware of the deal, but did not expect the election on the first ballot.

Bargaining Progresses.
Agents of Hodson visited the four Democrats and asked them what they would take to enter the Hodson band wagon.

"We have not arranged any slate," explained the Hodson representatives, and you can have whatever you want within reason."

With this the Hodson men withdrew around the corner and a few minutes later the Haines agents appeared.

Wright, Bowerman and Bingham negotiated with the Democratic quartet. The meeting was held in the governor's office, but the latter excused himself and listened to a Bryan meeting held in an adjoining room.

Prior to the meeting with the three Haines men, which was not their first meeting with the Haines workers, the Democrats had looked at the situation thus: Haines has 14 pledged votes and Hodson 8. The four Democratic votes would surely elect Haines, while they would be a trifling short of electing Hodson.

It was at this critical stage that Wright, Bowerman and Bingham came with new temptations to the four. The hands of the clock showed almost the time for balloting for the president.

"Well, here we are again," began the Haines agents. "Tell us what you want."

What Democrats Asked.
This is what the Democrats asked:

That the appointment of all commissions be made by the governor.

That the Haines followers support all vetoes of the governor where commissions are concerned.

That no legislation be introduced or allowed to pass which will curtail the patronage of the governor.

That they receive the chairmanship of the game committee, the counties committee, the penal institutions committee, the revision of laws committee, or, in lieu of that, the education committee.

Also that they be represented on the ways and means committee, on the railroad committee, on the judiciary committee, on the insurance and banking committee, on the engineering committee, and have the appointment of sundry clerks.

One or two other committees were discussed, but the written list of the concessions demanded was so blurred that all of it was not legible.

And last, but not least, the Democrats added that the Haines faction vote to sustain Governor Chamberlain's veto of the board of control bill. This veto has not yet been sent in.

With Two Minutes to Spare.
"Anything else you want?" sarcastically inquired the Haines men.

"That'll be about all," quoth the Democrats.

"Then we'll see what our fellows want to do about it," said the tempters.

"Take your time," was the answer. "You've five minutes, and remember, the Hodson crowd will give us what we are willing to take from you."

A hurried meeting of the 14 Haines men was held. All the pie Haines had in prospect had already been apportioned, conditionally. The demands of the Democrats were disgustingly wholesale. It was a case of sacrifice, so one by one various members of the 14 Haines men lopped off a few of their hopes until the Democratic demands could be met. The reply of the agents was brought to the Democrats two minutes before the time to open the session.

Delivering the Goods.
When the nominations were in order Bingham nominated Haines, and Miller, of Linn, nominated Coshaw, Hodson was not placed in nomination. The four Democrats voted for Coshaw, and when Wright's name was called and it was seen that Haines had only his steady 13, for he had modestly cast his vote for Bowerman. It was then time for the four Democrats to get into the game. Mult led off by changing his vote from Coshaw, the Democrat, to Haines, the Republican. Smith, of Yamhill, followed suit, then came Caldwell, and lastly Hedges. This gave Haines 17 votes, and elected him.
