

**DE COU'S ADDRESS  
ON THE PEACE  
MOVEMENT**

Professor E. E. DeCou, of the department of mathematics at the university, delivered a very interesting address yesterday in Villard hall, on "The World's Peace Movement." In his talk he outlined the history quite thoroughly, and told of the general trend and chief epochs in the movement of the past few years.

He said that in the last ten or fifteen years that the real movement, that is of importance now, had begun. Men who had been classed as dreamers, from Isaiah to Tolstol, have suggested a peace between the nations of the world, but few or no steps were taken before the last half century.

The thing which has made the peace movement more practical of late years, has been the great cost of war in war time and the extensive armament of land and naval forces in time of peace.

Europe today is an armed camp, each subject or citizen giving involuntarily from three to five years of his life in military service, besides supporting the army and navy the rest of his life by heavy taxes.

The United States is not quite as bad, but is rapidly moving in the direction that these other nations are going.

The first Hague Congress was called by the Czar of Russia in 1899, but though much was done, much thought to be impossible, the terms on which disarmament could be begun were not agreed.

The chief result, which is equally as great as disarmament, was the appointment of a permanent tribunal to arbitrate the differences of the nations. The first great case that came up under the new jurisdiction was the Venezuela trouble, which was handled to the chagrin of two or three European nations. Following cases have shown the idea to be a very practical one, and now nearly every nation of the world that is even half way civilized, has some sort of treaties for arbitration.

After mentioning the Inter-Parliamentary Union, the members of the parliaments and congresses and legislative bodies of the world, which has grown to a membership of 2,500 since 1889, Professor DeCou gave some idea of what the future would bring forth. He considers that disarmament, the next great step, will come gradually and not by common agreement. Arbitration will become so common that in time the nations will feel it useless to expend so much wealth in maintaining useless armies and navies and, outside of small police forces, will disband their vast organizations.

Prineville is only 125 miles from Eugene, but the temperature is from 20 to 35 degrees colder there than it is here. The following is a press dispatch from that city:

"It looks as if the Crook county cold snap was here to stay. Following yesterday's early morning temperature of 20 below zero, the weather continues clear with conditions all good for stock feeding, both for butcher stock and stock cattle and sheep.

"At Bend there is 18 inches of snow; at Prineville 2 inches; at Sam Smith's ranch on the Ochow, 2 inches of crusted snow; at Howard, 10 inches; at Hay Creek, 2 inches; at Culver, 3 inches. Wood has advanced. The ice crop is not yet good."
