SAYS 'FRISCO IS YET IN CHAOTIC CONDITION

A. C. Barbour, Walton Timberland Owner, Visits Bay City on Matters Connected With Purchase of Railroad Lands - Company Will Sell Agricultural Lands

A. C. Barbour, the well-known Walton farmer and timber land owner, has just returned from a trip to San Francisco, where he went to arrange with the Southern Pacific Company for deeds to railroad lands bought by him and which had been made out but not sent to Mr. Barbour because he had mislaid his contracts, the surrender of which was necessary before the railroad company would send him the deeds. Meantime in the San Francisco fire the deeds were burned, along with other archives of the Southern Pacific Company. Recently Mr. Barbour found his contracts and the railroad company will now write him new deeds.

Mr. Barbour states that he found the officials of the land department of the Southern Pacific Company disposed to help him in every legitimate way, even to readiness to eliminate so far as possible red tape regulations. What they required was proof, so far as it could be given, that the applicant's claims were just; all else they seemed to be very willing to accommodate to the wishes of their land purchasers as far as the regulations of their trustees permitted.

Sell Agricultural Lands.
Charles Eberlin, land agent for the Southern Pacific Company, told Mr. Barbour to inform his neighbors that the company will sell to those who will themselves use them agricultural lands in the Siuslaw valley, but such lands will first need to be appraised, as the records of former appraisements were lost in the fire.

City's Chaotic Condition.
Notwithstanding the graphic press accounts of the fire and its results Mr. Barbour was not prepared for the chaotic condition of the city and although much has been accomplished in restoring business facilities and many new "class A"—i. e., modern fire proof and earthquake proof buildings are in course of construction, what has been done is a very small item as compared with what remains to be done. Even on Market street the pavements are in very many places still torn up, and in other places either covered with lumber or with other building material. Pedestrians in walking up Market street must cross and recross to seek the best and least muddy walks, for mud was everywhere and at crossings almost impassable on streets in the burned district.

The cold wave extends far into "Sunny California." The real estate agents there are not just now selling climate as one of the chief assets of the country and even in the Rogue river valley people are talking not at all of the glorious climate of the "Italy of America."

WALSH INDICTED ON MANY COUNTS

Chicago, Jan. 18.—John R. Walsh, former president of the Chicago National Bank of this city, which closed its doors December 15, 1905, was today indicted by the federal grand jury for alleged misconduct in the management of the finances of the bank. The indictment is based upon 92 separate transactions in each of which it is claimed the funds of the bank were unlawfully used, and contains 182 counts, based upon the 92 financial operations conducted by Walsh.

NEW CASES AND MOTIONS IN CIRCUIT COURT

W. L. DeLano has begun suit in the circuit court against J. U. Sutherland and H. H. Plisk to recover the sum of \$200 on a promissory note.
Tena Rosalind Barbour has begun suit against the O. & C. R. Co. to compel the specific performance of a contract to deliver a deed to 80 acres of land in township 18, south of range 8, west.
In the case of J. C. Goodale vs. E. F. Gillette the defendant files a demurrer on the ground that the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action.
In the case of Minnie B. Temple vs. F. W. Osburn, trustee, et al., the defendants file a motion to strike out a part of the complaint.

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FUEL FAMINE WORSE NOW THAN EVER BEFORE

The fuel famine in Eugene is worse right now than it has been at any previous time this winter, and had the cold snap lasted a few days longer there would have been a good deal of suffering from the cold. All wood dealers were kept on the jump to supply the demand during the cold weather, and so much wood was burned that the supply in the hands of the dealers is limited to a very few cords. One dealer stated to a Guard reporter today that a week ago he had 80 cords on hand, but today he has not a stick and cannot obtain any, the rail shipments, for some reason unknown to him, having ceased. He has orders in for several carloads, but the car shortage or something of the kind prevents them from being shipped. It is stated that there are only six or eight cords of wood in the hands of the dealers here altogether, and if the situation is not relieved at once those who have not a supply already on hand will simply have to go without it. Coal cannot be obtained by any one, the dealers up north entirely ignoring the orders of the local dealers.

MUCH MONEY FOR OREGON WATERWAYS

Washington, Jan. 16.—The subcommittee that has had under consideration the Oregon and Columbia river items in the river and harbor bill has completed its report and is ready to lay its recommendations before the full committee. The subcommittee originally intended appropriating \$1,000,000 cash for the month of the Columbia, but the assistant to the chief of engineers was heard by the committee, and stated that \$750,000 was all that would be required to carry on the construction during the coming year, so the subcommittee will recommend a cash appropriation of only that amount, but will recommend that authority be given to expend an additional \$1,700,000, which will be ample to complete the south jetty. This authorization is as good as cash and will permit the engineers to let contracts for the entire work, the \$1,700,000 to be appropriated in the sundry civil bill of next session.

For Oregon Coast Harbors.

In addition to these items the subcommittee will recommend \$60,000 for the Coquille river, \$30,000 for Coos river, \$10,000 for Tillamook harbor, \$10,000 for the upper Columbia and Snake under the old project, \$100,000 for the canal at the Cascades, \$60,000 for the upper Willamette, and \$100,000 for the construction of a dredge for the harbors on the Oregon coast.

It is quite possible that the full committee will cut the appropriation for the Coquille to \$40,000, as that is the estimate of the war department, and in view of the large appropriation for the mouth of the Columbia, the items for the Cascade locks and upper Willamette will be slightly reduced. The report of the subcommittee will be considered by the full committee within a day or two, but its action will not be announced until the bill is reported Friday or Saturday. In the main it is believed that the committee will accept the recommendation of the subcommittee.

ARKANSAS WAGES WAR UPON TRUSTS

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 18.—Suits for alleged violation of the anti-trust laws were filed by the district attorney against Armour & Co., Waters-Pierce Oil Company, Hammond Packing Company, Morris & Co., and the Cudahy Packing Company today for amounts aggregating \$1,833,000. The action is based on the alleged continued violation in Arkansas of the anti-trust law after the first suit was filed last October, the judgment asked for being in the nature of penalties. What was regarded as a test case was decided by the supreme court last week in the case of the state against the Hammond Packing Company, and the validity of the law was upheld.
