

**SITUATION IS  
CRITICAL AT  
SHAWNEETOWN**

Apparently the crest of the flood was reached here at noon today, when the river dropped a tenth of an inch, to 95.1 feet. It is not expected to go below the danger line until Thursday or Friday.

Shawneetown, Jan. 21.—The statement is made by Mayor Kratz that the river has reached the 48 foot stage. He believes that the levee will hold until 53 feet is reached. After that it will be hard to tell the fate of Shawneetown. Six hundred residents have fled from the town. It is impossible to estimate the loss at this time.

River is Stationary.  
Cincinnati, Jan. 21.—The Ohio river at Cincinnati is stationary and it is believed that the end of the flood is in sight. Cold weather, which it is expected will hold back the flood, will occasion greater suffering for the homeless.

Cold Adds To Suffering.  
Louisville, Jan. 21.—The river is still rising. The cold weather has added to the misery of the homeless.

**GOVERNOR OF JAMAICA

**WOMAN IS BRUTALLY MURDERED**

Bellingham, Wash., Jan. 21.—Miss Adell Roper, clerk in a dry goods store, was brutally murdered at Blaine Saturday night. It is believed that the object of the attack was robbery, as the woman had a reputation of keeping a considerable sum of money in the house.

It is believed that the woman put up such a stubborn fight that her assailants took her life in order to escape detection. After the murder oil was poured on the body and the house set afire, but the fire was put out before the body was consumed. It was found that two blows had been struck on the back of the head with some blunt instrument and one under the ear with the blade of an ax, the left ear being severed. A handkerchief was also stuffed in the woman's mouth.

Raymond Lange was arrested shortly after the crime was discovered but the coroner's jury acquitted him and he is being held as a witness. Harry Watts, a frequenter of saloons, is now under arrest.

Clever Actress Who Appears as Star in "The Three of Us."

**WARFARE IN THE AIR.**

The Ideas of General Crozier and His Military and Scientific Record.

General William Crozier, chief of the ordnance department of the government, has the conviction that we are on the eve of great things in the way of application of the inventions and discoveries in aeronautics to warfare. "It would appear," says the general, "that we are on the threshold of practical and successful aerial navigation." He believes that aerial warships armed with a new explosive more deadly than any previously known will soon be in the service of the United States.

These opinions of the head of the ordnance department are considered to have the more weight in that he has long been known as one of the most learned and scientific officers in the

When President Roosevelt appointed him to succeed General Bullington as chief of ordnance the appointment was for a time opposed in the senate because so many officers who were his seniors had been passed over in promoting him to the post. The president declared that if the opponents of General Crozier could present the name of a senior officer who could show more

elements of fitness he would at once withdraw his name and send in that of the better man. Not long afterward General Crozier's appointment was confirmed. It developed that his promotion had come without his seeking it and was due to the belief of Secretary Root, then at the head of the war department, that his military record proved him the man for the place.

General Crozier is the son of a judge and was born in Carrollton, O., in 1855. He graduated from West Point in 1878, was assigned to the Fourth artillery, served three years in the west under Crook and Howard in Indian campaigns, was for some years an instructor in mathematics and natural philosophy at West Point, entered the ordnance department by competitive examination, was major and inspector general of volunteers in the Spanish war and in 1890 was appointed by President McKinley American military delegate to the peace conference at The Hague, where he made a notable fight against the use of the explosive bullet in warfare. He was chief ordnance officer of the Peking relief expedition in 1900 and came to his present position in 1901.

At a recent meeting of a British military society a speaker declared, "There is no doubt whatever that aerial ships will play an important part in future wars," and Major B. F. S. Baden-Powell, an authority on the subject, advised the British nation to prepare for the impending change.
