NO RELIEF IN SIGHT

It begins to look as if nothing would be accomplished by the legislature in the way of remedial legislation at Salem this session. Evidently there are strong corporate influences at work secretly to defeat action, and among the proposed measures doomed the railroad commission law is especially marked. Either there will be no commission at all or it will be so constituted that it will be worse than none. The opposition has veiled its attack by raising a newspaper discussion over the question of whether the governor should appoint or the legislature elect, a shrewd move that will give opponents of the measure an opportunity to oppose it on some extraneous ground.

Other salutary legislation for which the development clubs of the state have been working for the past two years will probably fall of enactment, and when the legislature adjourns at the end of the forty days' session Oregon will still remain in the grasp of the corporations who are stifling its industries and robbing its people on every hand.

A weekly publication is seeking advertising by demanding that the senate investigate the alleged sale of a senatorship in Colorado, though it gives no reason for singling out Colorado, when there is an open market for senatorships in so many states.

Judge Gaynor, of the New York supreme court, thinks Oliver Cromwell's blunt words, "If there be any one that makes many poor to make a few rich, that suits not a commonwealth," are applicable to existing conditions. Good think.

Congressman Davis, of Minnesota, has endeared himself to the government clerks in Washington, by introducing a bill to add 20 per cent to their salaries, but what his constituents will say is another proposition entirely.

LOVE FOR GOD

By Francis Xavier

FRANCIS XAVIER (Navarro, Spain, April 7, 1566—Island of Sandan, Dec. 2, 1625) was a famous Spanish missionary, the apostle to the Indians and one of the founders of the Society of Jesus. He labored incessantly in carrying the gospel to many lands and died on his way to China. It is thought that he translated this hymn from the Spanish into the Latin. From the latter it was translated into English by Edward Caswall.

SPRAY YOUR FRUIT TREES THIS YEAR

The work done last year has demonstrated what can be accomplished by thorough spraying, and as a consequence this year all fruitgrowers are preparing for this work.

Some people who have only a few trees may think it not worth while to spray, but they must remember that they are standing in the way of progress and should either care for their trees or dig them up.

Fruit Inspector McCornack informs us that the law will be strictly enforced this year.

Last year some property owners in Eugene failed to have their fruit trees sprayed because the parties doing the spraying had more than they could do. This year it is expected that a gasoline engine with an up-to-date spraying outfit will be ready to go to work at once. If you hear it in your vicinity do not let it pass your door without having your trees sprayed.
