VOLUNTEERS AFTER THEIR TRAVEL PAY

Philippine Fighters Will Make Effort to Secure \$400 or Over Per Man Said to Be Due Them From the Government

Another effort is being made by members of the Second Oregon United States Volunteer Infantry to secure travel pay from Manila to San Francisco. At the last meeting of Scott Young Camp No. 2, Spanish American War Veterans, it was unanimously voted to bring the matter to the attention of the Oregon congressional delegation with the hope of securing favorable action by congress.

In the event that the movement is successfully inaugurated by the Oregon men, those of 12 other Western regiments will follow suit and endeavor to secure the money. It is said that the pay will amount to a trifle more than \$400 per man. Some of those discharged in the islands previous to the outbreak of the insurrection were given travel pay to San Francisco, and from there to the point of enlistment, with those who were brought home in a body received travel pay merely from San Francisco to Portland, amounting to about \$30, as they are discharged at the Bay City.

Legal advice has been retained and the men believe they have a claim for the money. It is felt by them in view of the fact that they enlisted for the Spanish-American war, but were retained in service nearly a year after the treaty of peace was signed, and finally pitted against the swarthy forces of Amelio Aguinaldo, the Philippine renegade, that they are entitled to consideration. Troops sent to Cuba were discharged immediately upon the cessation of hostilities, while those who went to the Philippines served almost a year longer, being paid \$15.60 a month and losing the difference between that and the wages they would have received at home, or in other words the men discharged from the Cuban campaign earned more during that time in civilian vocations. GIVES HOME READERS TIME

Senate Grants Relief to Northwest On Account of Car Shortage.

Washington, Jan. 22.—The senate today passed a joint resolution providing that all persons who have made homestead entries in North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming, where the six months period required to establish residence expired or expires after December 1, 1906, shall be granted until May 15, 1907, within which to make actual settlement and establish residence upon the land so entered. The concession thus granted is on account of obstacles to settlement caused by the car shortage and fuel famine in the West and North west. Idaho was inserted on Heyburn's motion.

CHANGES IN OFFICIAL LIST

Promotions in Harriman System Effective February 1

Portland, Or., Jan. 23.—Several important changes in the official list of the allied Harriman lines have become known. The official announcement has not yet been made, but is expected within the next few days. The position of district freight agent of the O. R. & N., made vacant by the resignation of George J. Mohler, will be filled by Archibald MacCorquedale, general agent of the freight department here.

H. E. Lounsbury, district freight agent of the Southern Pacific, will be named to succeed MacCorquedale as general agent at Portland. Charles Malboeuf, chief clerk in the freight department, will succeed Mr. Lounsbury as district freight agent for the Southern Pacific.

It is expected that James H. Mulchay, rate clerk in the freight department, will be made chief clerk in the general freight department to succeed Mr. Malboeuf.

L. B. Henderson, chief rate clerk in the general freight office, will leave the Harriman service to become traffic manager of the Pacific Coast Biscuit Company. He has been connected with the traffic department of the Harriman lines for several years.

All these changes are to become effective February 1, and will probably be announced by circular today or tomorrow upon the return of R. B. Miller, general freight agent, from the interstate commerce commission hearing at Seattle.
