

**FRIENDLY'S
TEAM MEETS
WITH DEFEAT**

The Husky Ashland Athletics Outplayed the Local Team in Fine Game of Basketball Last Night. Score Was 37 to 23 - Friendly's Showed Lack of Team Work

In an exciting and very even game until the last ten minutes the Friendly Athletic Club went down to defeat before the basketball team of the Ashland Athletic Club by the score of 37 to 23 last night in the armory hall. The first half was the more even and exciting. Both teams played good ball, Friendly's having part of the time hard luck on baskets. The score at the end of the first half was 17 to 14, in favor of Ashland. The second half witnessed some superb team work, especially on the part of Ashland, and toward the latter part of the game they piled up the score rapidly that half standing 29 to 8.

Though Friendly's beat Ashland twice on their opponent's floor, last night they were outclassed to some extent. Their team was a little different from the line-up at Ashland, King playing at his old position at center, which Stevenson had filled, and Watson playing forward where Kuykendall did against Ashland. Yet both of these men put up good games and the defeat cannot be attributed altogether to them. However, the locals have one game the best of the visitors, and the enthusiasts of Eugene all know that the team here has often demonstrated this. They can play faster and better than they did last night.

For Ashland "Happy" Eastland at forward was the star. His playing was almost remarkable. Spencer, the centre, an immense man, also played really fine, though very rough. The rest of the Ashland team were in the game from start to finish, though they did not play the phenomenal game of these two.

King, at centre, for Eugene, though pitted against a man thirty pounds heavier, did some clever work, and it was worth the price of admission to see him fight against his large and active opponent. Smith and Farrington played hard ball, at guard, but did not succeed in holding their men as close in the last half as in the first. The forwards Marksbury and Watson, with the rest of the team, did some nice team work, but all seemed to be in bad form shooting their baskets, for the narrow misses were heart rending.

In a small boy's preliminary the teams of fantastically dressed youngsters tied each other by the score of 2 to 2.
