Francis Galloway, '06, of McMinnville, won second place for the interstate contest with the college of Oregon. This contest will be held March 8 at McMinnville.

Two others tried Paul Bond, '06, whose subject was the "Triumph of Arbitration," and Ramon Mackie, '10, with the subject "Aid From France." Both were very good. McKinney's subject was "The Blight of Precedent," and Galloway's "The Stigma on Government."

Wallace G. Trill will represent Willamette University at the interstate debate at McMinnville next March. He won the tryout debate at Salem last night, his subject being "The March to Democracy."

WALK ABOUT W. KNIVES IN SKULLS

Two Men With Blades Stuck In Their Heads Captured by New York Police.

Two stabblings in widely separated parts of New York city went on record in the police stations, where they were recorded as the most remarkable in the history of the precinct.

In each case the victim was an Italian, and each of the wounded men found it impossible to withdraw the knife which was buried to the hilt in the Italian's head. One of the men, with four other wounds in his body,

walked unaided two blocks to a drug store with a stiletto six inches long protruding from his left eye.

With the arrival of an ambulance from the Lincoln hospital at the drug store at Morris avenue and One Hundred and Fiftieth street the Italian, who had not lost consciousness, said he was George Zappoli, thirty-seven years old, and had no home. The ambulance surgeon attempted to pull the knife out of the wound, but with the exertion of all his strength he could not move it. Finally, with assistance, he succeeded in dislodging the point, which had been imbedded in the man's skull.

Zappoli said he had been attacked in Morris avenue, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets, by five men, only one of whom used a knife. He was found to have been stabbed in the left arm, in the back of the head, in the back and in the left eye.

Genaro Fabozzi of 74 Mott street, a longshoreman, was the other victim. He told a policeman from the Leonard street station, who found him at Laight and Greenwich streets, that some person had attacked him while he was on his way to work on the Pennsylvania railroad pier at the foot of Laight street. A jackknife with a six inch blade was found firmly imbedded in the back of the man's skull.

When a surgeon arrived he was unable to withdraw the knife. At the Hudson Street hospital Dr. Merrill, Dr. Edwin N. Higgins and Dr. W. H. A. Warner undertook the task of removing the blade. The skull was delicately chiseled around the blade, and after two hours the knife was removed.
