MULTNOMAH COUNTY LOSES IN LIVELY TILT

Guard Special Service.

Salem, Jan. 29.—The first fight in the house came this morning over the resolution of Wilson to increase the assessment and taxation committee to seven and add the two from Multnomah's delegation. Chairman Newell, of the committee, said: "I am opposed to the motion, for we have had two sessions, and to increase the committee would cause delay and delay. Multnomah can get fair treatment without representation."

Jones, of Polk-Linnco, said: "There are no more needed on the committee, for it would have to do the work all over."

The speaker said the move came from Multnomah and if the resolution passed he would appoint two extra members from that delegation. "Multnomah pays a third of all Oregon taxes, and should have a place on the committee," said Northup, of Multnomah.

Half a dozen members opposed the motion and the distrust of Multnomah was indirectly expressed.

"Are you fellows afraid of Multnomah?" asked Coffey, of Multnomah.

"All we ask is fair treatment. We are the biggest and richest county and we demand representation."

Chairman Newell retorted:

"The committee will get along better if it is unchanged."

The vote of the house showed that Multnomah could not swing a majority for the resolution, although it was favorably reported by the resolution committee, and it was lost, 35 to 23. Marion, Lane, Linn, Washington and other big delegations united against Multnomah.

In the Senate.

The senate cleared the desk of everything this morning. All bills were read a first, second and third time. New bills introduced are:

S. B. 147, by Kay, amending the code relating to the fees of the secretary of state.

S. B. 148, by Smith, of Umatilla, to create Cascade county.

The following bills on the third reading were enacted:

S. B. 75, by Coshaw, declaring marriages and divorces made in sister states valid.

S. B. 83, by Malarkey, relating to the incorporation of educational institutions. This measure is to enable the fulfillment of the will of Mrs. Reed.

COMMISSIONERS TO AID SUPREME COURT

Salem, Or., Jan. 29.—The supreme court being a year behind in its work, Senator Cooke has introduced a bill providing for the appointment of two commissioners, each serving two years, to draw the same salary as the supreme justices. The appointments must have the approval of the court.

LACK TWO JURORS IN THAW CASE

New York, Jan. 29.—When the morning session of the Thaw trial ended there remained two vacant seats in the jury box, and the impression of those following the case seems to be that a complete jury will be expected before night. The defendant's attorney set a new record for peremptory challenges, bringing this privilege to bear five times in excluding talesmen from service. A new panel of one hundred men was in court today, but none of them have been drawn.

RAILROADS REFUSE RATES TO SOLDIERS

Omaha, June 29.—The Union Pacific and Northwestern roads have refused to make special rates to the government for shipment of soldiers enroute to the Philippines to and from San Francisco.

Washington, Jan. 29.—This is the 65th anniversary of the birth of William McKinley. As such and as "carnation day" it is being observed generally in the National capital.
